Mrs Lizzie M Ripley was appointed postmaster at Folley, Tillamook county. A new postoffice was established at Carson, Union county, with Lucretia Hoopingarner as postmistress.

The forger's name is supposed to be Harry Foster, and the amount represented was \$30. He also succeeded in swindling certain parties in towns north of Redding.

The Dalles Chronicle says: A letter just received by a leading citizen, formerly from Germany, from friends in that country, states that the empire is suffering from a drought the severest ever known. Many farmers cannot get their seed back, and thousands will make an attempt to harvest. The hay crop is almost a total failure, and the letter states that 1,000 pounds of hay sold there for 45 marks, or at the rate of \$22.40 per ton.

They recently arrived in this country from Europe and are making a tour of the United States, seeking pleasure and recreation. They were dressed in hunting costume and each one carried a gun.
