

More than a fourth of the gold and more than a third of the silver produced throughout the world was mined in the United States.

In attempting to find fault with the Democratic nominee for Governor of Ohio the Republican newspapers are unable to discover that he voted for either the McKinley or the Sherman law.

Whatever congress may do with silver under no circumstances should they provide for a silver dollar less current than gold. The masses of the people want a sound dollar whether capitalists or money sharks do or not.

The total revenues of the public schools of the United States are: From permanent endowments, \$9,825,127; from taxes, state, \$25,117,077; local, \$88,920,850—\$113,505,412; from other sources, \$8,794,431; total revenue, \$135,125,010.

A Washington special says: Silver men admit now that the repeal vote will pass the house by a large majority because of peculiar variety of free coinage views, in matter of ratio, but they hope the senate will return the bill to the house with certain changes favorable to free coinage.

It is very touching to hear Gov. McKinley pray God that the free traders will for once live up to their promises. If Gov. McKinley's breeches are as full of shoddy as those of many of his fellow citizens who have been put under the McKinley law he will have to moderate his praying or get the knees patched.

The army worm is proving very destructive to wheat fields in some parts of Minnesota. The wheat is late in ripening, and very dry weather has favored the rapid multiplication of the worm. In one body of wheat that was estimated to yield 100,000 bushels, the entire crop has been destroyed and it will not be harvested.

A few weeks ago, when Major McKinley was renominated for the Ohio governorship, he attributed the unsettled condition of the country to the fact that President Cleveland had not called congress together to repeal republican legislation. Now the major says that the chief cause of trouble is the fear that republican legislation will be repealed. This ought to effectually explode the old charge that the major never gets in a new speech.

An inexpensive way to acquire a little cheap notoriety has been resorted to by Senator Lodge of Massachusetts and Senator Mitchell of Oregon. They want congress to pass a resolution that nothing shall be done with the tariff until 1897. Of course both these men know, as well as an ordinary 17-year-old school boy, that such a resolution would have no binding force whatever on the congress that meets next year. One congress can not bind another in such a way. Both men know equally well that there is not even the shadow of a prospect of the passage of such a resolution, but like true demagogues they seek the notoriety such a move would give them and the supposed advantage of making themselves solid with the protected barons of the country. This congress was elected on the direct issue of a reform of the tariff and it is nothing short of an insult to ask men thus elected to declare by resolution that they will not carry out the will of the people.

Molly Stark not only did not die a widow because of the valorous battle of Bennington, but she lived on to become a noble mother in Israel, and at one time thirty out of forty of the children attending the district school in what is called the "Stark district" of New Hampshire were named Stark. They were all descendants of the four children Molly bore to the hero of Bennington. Now, however, the name is almost extinct in New Hampshire, and in Manchester, the centre of the Stark district, only two or three persons are left to bear the name of the brave General of the Revolution. Molly Stark has a namesake now living in Alameda, Cal., a little girl of thirteen years, who is in the sixth generation in lineal descent from the heroine of Bennington.

The senate finance committee has decided to report favorably on the bill to repeal the purchase section of the Sherman law.

The votes by which it was reported are: Chairman Voorhees and Senators McPherson, Morrill, Sherman, Allison and Aldrich, the last four republicans. The full text of the bill, omitting the clause is:

That so much of the act approved July 14, 1890, entitled "An act directing the purchase of silver bullion, and the issue of treasury notes, and for other purposes," as directs the secretary of the treasury to purchase from time to time silver bullion to the aggregate amount of 4,500,000 ounces, or so much thereof as may be offered in each month, at the market price thereof, not exceeding \$1 for 371.25 grains pure silver, and to issue in payment for such purchase treasury notes of the United States, be and the same is hereby repealed. And it is hereby declared that it is the policy of the United States to continue the use of both gold and silver as standard money, and to coin both gold and silver into money of equal intrinsic and exchangeable value, such equality to be secured through international agreement or by such safeguards of legislation as shall secure the maintenance of a parity in the value of coins in the two materials and the equal power of every dollar at all times in the markets and in payment of debts. And it is hereby further declared that the efforts of the government should be steadily directed to the establishment of such a safe system of bimetallicism as will maintain at all times the equal power of every dollar coined or issued by the United States in the markets and in the payment of debts.
