At the meeting of the Building & Loan Association last night the money was loaned to Mrs Hyman at 66 months interest in advance. Mrs Hyman proposes erecting a residence on her city property.

The first bale of hops of this season was taken to Eugene yesterday and was sold for 25 cents a pound; the extra price being paid on account of its being the first bale. They will be shipped to London.

The Eagle woolen mills will close temporarily Saturday evening, in order that new floors can be put in, in at least two rooms. It is also stated that several other minor improvements will be made.—Brownsville Times.

T Butler has sold his King's Prairie farm to Portland parties for \$4000. They will probably buy most of the prairie and set out an immense prune orchard, to be occupied by tenants. W J Turnage is offered \$4000 for his 160 acres.—Cor. Press.

This afternoon at sheriff's sale the C P Burkhardt farm adjoining Albany, was sold at public auction, and bid in by the plaintiff, the Oregon Mortgage Company at \$6824. It consists of 320 acres of first class land.

E M Burkhardt, one of the enterprising farmers of Albany prairie, threshed fifty-one acres of wheat this week which yielded 1430 bushels, an average of 28 bushels per acre.

Mr J M Archibald's wheat did not turn out as well as he expected, yielding only 28 bushels per acre on 50 acres. Mr Zulesdorfer's went some better, 35 bushels per acre. All together the yield is a good one.

The Three Sisters is now engaged in building a wing dam on the Black Dog bar about eight miles this side of Albany. She will be in Salem Saturday and return to Corvallis Sunday with about ten tons of household goods.—Statesman.

There is some talk of the Oregon Pacific putting an extra steamer on their Yaquina division this coming fall. This will give the company a five day service instead of a boat leaving every ten days as now and will be quite a factor in inducing patronage.

OUR FRUIT.—The Riddle Enterprise says: It is estimated that the "Glenbrook" fruit farm of Judge Riddle, will produce 200,000 pounds of green fruit this year, principally prunes. Mr Stella Riddle estimates about the same yield from his prune orchard. The Oakleigh Heights fruit farm of A Riddle & Son will produce 130,000 pounds while like proportions of pounds to the acreage will be the results of the orchards of J B Riddle, Mr Dean, G K Quine, Gazley Brys, J Weaver, J Chadwick, John Hall and many others. It is safe to estimate at least 2,000,000 pounds of green prunes for the South Umpqua and Cow Creek valleys alone. It will require quite an amount of help to place this product in proper condition for the market.
