

A WASTE OF BREATH.

Senator Chandler propounds and several republican newspapers repeat this question. Why should not the banks, the chamber of commerce and the newspapers recognize and state the exact truth: That the present distressed condition of the business of the country is due to the approaching assault upon the McKinley bill in particular and upon the American protective system in general?

Because the persons referred to are not mostly fools. None but fools would imagine that a people can be thrown into panic by the prospect of securing their own demand, twice made at the polls, for a reduction of oppressive taxes.

Daniel Webster, that colossal son of New Hampshire, viewing in Jove-like jocundity the local wonder of Genesee Falls, grandiloquently said that "no nation ever lost its liberties that had a waterfall 96 feet high." Can the Litigant senator of the Granite state point to a nation that ever lost its head over a prospect of tax reduction?

No!—this is a financial, not a commercial disturbance. The primary trouble is with the currency, not with credits. It is the nation's money that is menaced, not its manufactures. The collapse of swindling trusts has added to the lack of confidence, but these trusts were another outcome of the policy which Mr Chandler has supported.

The question of tariff reform is closed for four years at least. The beneficiaries and the political agents of the system of tariff for bounties—of public taxes for private tribute—may as well understand this. The people have ordered a reduction of the worse-than-war tariff, and it is to be reduced. The democratic congress and president may be divided on some questions, but they are united on this.

The country looks for this reduction in relief, not in fear. The time has gone by when it can be either bamboozled or frightened by the free trade bugbear. Mr Chandler and the republican organs that echo him are wasting their breath.—Ex

Ex-Senator Tabor's career would make a good sensational novel. From the time he drove a wagon across the plains and sold flour and bacon and frying pans to miners till now it has been full of adventure, and he has made and lost many millions. His divorce is still remembered here, and I am told that society has forever shut its doors against him and his wife. Mrs Tabor No. 1 has grown rich, and she is worth nearly a million. The property which Tabor gave her at the demands of the courts has greatly increased in value. She has invested her income well and she is rich and respected. Tabor's son Maxcey is a successful business man and he is fast accumulating a fortune. He manages the Brown Palace Hotel here, and his wife is considered the most beautiful woman in Denver.

George Washington Murray, the negro representative in congress of the "black district" of South Carolina, says in his autobiography prepared for the new congressional directory that when a lad of eleven he was "bereft of both parents and thrown upon the rugged shores of early emancipation, and without a friend to rely on he entered upon the fierce combat for the indispensable bread of life." He fought his battle very well, for he was able to secure the advantage of a college education and was for many years a teacher in South Carolina. He is the most interesting of colored congressmen ever seen at the capital, for he is of African blackness and one of the tallest men in the house.

One of the officers of the Peary expedition writes home from Labrador that the banks on the Falcon are uncomfortably hard. "I made an examination of my own and found that it was stuffed with excelsior and a kind of swamp hay." A naval officer capable of such a complaint as this is hardly of the stuff from which Arctic explorers are made. He is better fitted to caper nimbly in some Philadelphia drawing room than to dance the quarter deck to the accompaniment of boreal blasts from the pole.

Chairman Wilson, of the ways and means committee, says:

"The committee will probably prepare a general tariff bill in accordance with the declarations of the Chicago platform. I think it quite probable that congress will find itself in a position to adjourn about the middle of September until the date of the regular session."

In talking about the work of the appropriations committee, Chairman Styres made similar observations.

The sword that Ethan Allen flourished over the head of the British commander at Ticonderoga has been offered to the government at Washington for exhibition. It has been in the possession of the Allen family since the death of the Green Mountain worthy in 1780, and the blade is nicked and scarred enough to make it a relic of the past.

Congressman Wilson, of West Virginia who was selected to introduce the repeal bill in the House, has grown gray since his last appearance in Washington. His hair, in fact, is almost white and in marked contrast to his youthful face. Not the least of the good things that even his enemies find to say about Mr Wilson is that he is as modest as he is brilliant.

The President, under date of August 1, 1893, has issued an executive order directing that so much of the executive order of May 7, 1877, as provides that pensions due to inmates of the various branches of the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers shall be paid at the agency in Washington, D C, is hereby revoked. It is also directed that after July 1, 1893, all pensions due to inmates of the several branches of said home shall be paid by the pension agent in whose agency district said branch home is located. It is said at the Interior Department that this order is made in consequence of the high rate of exchange between the Western towns, where very many of the homes are located, and New York. It is expected that the saving in exchange alone to the several homes will be approximately \$25,000 a year.

The immense sycamore tree on the banks of the Sandusky River, just at the edge of the village of Upper Sandusky, is dying and the fact is most regrettable, for the tree is the largest of its species east of the Rockies. It is forty-one feet in girth at the base of the trunk, and for years it has been one of the sights of Northern Ohio. Near it Col Crawford was burned at the stake by Indians, and the tradition is that he would have been burned at the very roots of the tree had not the chief feared the vengeance of the Great Father for such an act of sacrilege. In later times the tree was a favorite point of resort for the young men of Sandusky who played cards on Sandys beneath its umbrageous branches.
