MR. WEATHERFORD'S RECORD.

Some days ago the Salem Independent stated that in due time it would show up Senator Weatherford's legislative record and gave out strong hints that it would unearth very damaging things concerning him. The public has been waiting with bated breath to hear the roar of the volcanic explosion that was to burst with unrelenting cold bloodedness over the devoted head of our senator. Well, the volcano has exploded and it proved to be a mere "flash in the pan," a veritable fizzle. To show the character of the article we subjoin the following taken from the Marion county Democrat which explains the animus of the Independent. Mr. Weatherford's standing in this state is not to be shaken by such twaddle as the Independent indulges in. But read the article of the Salem Democrat:

The Independent has at last made its promised attack upon Senator Weatherford, and the burden of it is that Mr. Weatherford fails to see as the Independent's editor sees in regard to Supt. Downing. This appears to be the animus of the attack, and it is so plain that it will do the senator no harm whatever. Mr. McMahan's hostility to Downing has become a monomania and he loses sight of the fact that people tire of a persistent attack upon one man. It may be that he is inspired by the purest motives but the impression is gaining ground that personal animosity has had considerable to do with it and his attack upon Mr. Weatherford because he exonerated Mr. Downing tends to strengthen that impression. As to the charge that Mr. Weatherford received pay for several hundred miles that he did not travel, and that he was entitled to but \$8.40 for his trip from and to his home at Albany, we call attention to the fact that he was a member of the committee to investigate the Walla Walla jute mill and traveled several hundred miles in the performance of his duty. Mr. McMahan has been diligently searching the records and yet he seems to have overlooked this fact.

In company with a majority of the legislature, Senator Weatherford voted for the normal school, jute mill and soldier's home appropriations. We believe that they were all good measures and commend the senator for his course. It is at least true that they were supported by a majority of the legislature and do not constitute an exceptional ground for attacking Mr. Weatherford. The charge of taking excessive mileage having been proven false, Mr. McMahan's only reason for attacking the senator proves to be that he failed to convict Mr. Downing of improper management of the penitentiary.

The Times Mountaineer speaking of the silver plank in the democratic platform adopted at Chicago, arrives at the conclusion that the democrats "did not say what they meant nor mean what they said." Well, all that aside, for the opportunity of seeing what the party which the Mountaineer adheres to said and what it meant. The republicans in their platform said: "The American people, from tradition and interest, favor bimetallism, and the republican party demands the use of both gold and silver as the standard money." This is very similar to the position taken in Chicago by the democrats. It is the boast now of republican papers that that party is mainly in favor of a gold standard only. The Mountaineer itself is a monometalist seeking to place the country on a gold basis. Now please tell us what the republicans said in 1892 and what they mean in 1893.

Now, then, comes one seeking information and asks what is meant by the ratio of 16 to 1 when speaking of the coinage of gold and silver. Under the United States law, as now in force, twenty-five and eighty-eighths grains of standard gold, and four hundred and twelve and one-half grains, standard silver, constitute a dollar. This is very nearly at the ratio of 16 grains of silver to one of gold. Standard gold and silver means either metal at nine tenths fine and one tenth alloy. The alloy of gold is pure silver and the alloy of silver is pure copper.

## A QUERY.

The Salem Democrat is after the Oregonian with a sharp stick. We have examined the point to that stick and feel perfectly safe in saying that the Oregonian will keenly feel the prod. The Democrat says: During the campaign preceding the last presidential election the Oregonian and other republican papers denounced the views held by President Cleveland on the tariff question, not for the reason that he favored a revenue tariff, but because, as they alleged, his idea was to favor the manufacturer at the expense of the producer of raw material. It distinctly stated and all the republican papers in the State re-echoed it, that Mr. Cleveland's policy of free raw materials might find favor in the East, but the West would vigorously oppose it. Of course the result proved that it was mistaken, as the greater gains were made in Western States and notably in wool growing states. Now that Mr. Cleveland is president and no tariff bill can become a law without his signature, the Oregonian charges that every shout down of a cotton or woolen mill is caused by tariff legislation. An explanation of this seeming contradiction is anxiously awaited. To put it in the form of a query: If Mr. Cleveland and the democratic party are the special allies of the Eastern woolen manufacturers, (as was charged during the campaign) why should said manufacturers shut down?

The Albany Democrat asks by what authority we classed it among the anti-silver papers, and says "there is no truth in it." We have no desire or intention to misrepresent any one on this or any other subject, but made the statement on the authority of the Democrat itself, after reading a number of its articles, all disparaging silver and silver miners and those who are trying to legislate so that silver will be coined and circulated as money the same as gold.—Eugene Journal
