"GEN" HOLMES ARRESTED.—"Gen"
N B Holmes, of Canas valley, was arrested
Saturday and brought to town, his bonds
being fixed at \$2000. The circumstances
are about as follows: Holmes sold all his
remaining land, notes, etc., a week ago to
Geo Smith, realizing about \$5500, and gave
out that he would soon leave for New York.
Upon receipt of this news Attorney W R
Willis, who represented Dillard and Holmes
in the Owens bond case, which finally re-
sulted in a judgment against them for
about \$18,000 in the U S supreme court,
made a demand on Holmes for \$1800 at-
torney fees in this case. Payment was refused
and Judge Willis caused the old man's ar-

UNCERTAIN BUSINESS.—The following
from the Review, of Roseburg, emphasizes
the uncertainty of buying subpoenas before
county courts have passed on the claims:
"P. L. Leonard was arrested Friday morn-
ing by Marshal Carroll and locked up in
the city jail, charged with obtaining money
by false pretenses. Leonard was a wit-
ness in the 'Hero' Richardson case and was
subpoenaed in Roseburg. He claimed
mileage from Portland, 396 miles, and one
day's attendance, amounting to \$41.00,
when he was only entitled to one day's at-
tendance and two miles, amounting to
\$2.20. He disposed of his claim to Mrs.
Nellie Moore, who caused his arrest. At
the examination before Justice Hamlin it
was found that Leonard really had no in-
tention of swindling, and thought he was
entitled to the amount claimed. It seems
that he came from Portland at the request
of the prosecuting attorney but was not
subpoenaed until after he arrived in Rose-
burg, and the county court would only al-
low him twenty cents mileage. As a con-
sequence Mrs Moore is out considerable
money."

The Latest Market Report.

Received by the Red Crown Mills this
morning:

PORTLAND, OR., Aug. 29th.

Wheat very inactive as to spot business
and not a great deal doing in the interior,
but the talk is that the sales ahead have
been made at about 85c for Walla Walla
delivered here. As to other markets no
radical changes have occurred and none an-
ticipated for a few days at least. In a gen-
eral way some confidence is expressed that
wheat will do better after first rush of sup-
plies is over, but much depends upon the
financial situation. Should money become
easier and more available for speculation,
wheat will naturally advance, as the feeling
is that present values are very much below
what should rule under normal conditions.
Consequently the future hinges mostly upon
the money question.

Hope—Appearances indicate a good mar-
ket at stiff prices for hops after a while. At
present not much coin is available for for-
ward buying and naturally the ordinary
speculative movement is very much cur-
tailed. Buyers talk about 15c for choice as
full export value but 20c is more commonly
considered.

Freights—Exporters are refusing tonnage
at 37 1/2 owing in part to liberal supply
already engaged and partly to fears that
from now on wheat must get the benefit of
whatever improvement may occur abroad.

On a Conservative Basis.

OWING to the present monetary strin-
gency and during the existing condi-
tion of the financial market, I find it
compulsory to run my business on a very
conservative basis. Sugar, as you are
aware, is handled on a very small margin
of profit; a small in fact to scarcely pay
for the handling of it, and the terms upon
which it is bought are very strict (cash
only.) While money was plentiful and
collections good, I was able to allow sugar
bills to run 60 days; but conditions at
present are such that I will sell sugar for
cash only. I assure you I was very reluc-
tant to make a rule of this kind, but the
conditions of the market are such as to
make it imperative. Trusting you will
look at this in the proper light and also
understand that this rule applies generally.

WEATHER BUREAU

Crop weather bulletin, No 23, of the
Oregon State Weather Service, for the week
ending Tuesday, August 29th, 1893. B S
Fague, local forecast official.

The weather during the past week was
dry, clear and warm, with light to fresh,
northwest to northeast winds. The mean
temperature ranged from 66 to 68 degrees.
The smoke from forest fires became more
dense in the Willamette valley and in the
southern counties.

Harvesting and threshing of fall wheat
is complete in many sections. Late sown
spring grain is being cut. The straw is
short, but the heads appear to be well filled.
Some spring wheat in the Willamette val-
ley has been threshed with favorable re-
sults, yielding beyond expectations. The
yield in the coast and southern counties of
the state averages about 20 bushels per
acre, which is below the average. An av-
erage crop of oats will be secured in most
sections. The potato crop requires rain to
make an average yield. The crop has suf-
fered most in southern counties. Vegeta-
bles are plentiful for home consumption.

The dry spell failed to injure vegetables
growing in low ground. Champion prunes
are ripe and are being shipped to eastern
markets. The muskmelon crop will not be
a success. More favorable reports have been
received from Jackson county concerning
the corn crop than from other counties.
Under the influence of the warm, sunny
weather, fruit is maturing rapidly. There
will be an abundance of plums, pears and
prunes generally over the state, and in in-
terior counties the apple crop is large. In
the coast counties butter making has re-
ceived a check, owing to failing pastures.
Regardless of unfavorable influences, the
hop crop promises to mature well. The
damages of hop lice have been unimpor-

tant.
