The oldest statue in the world is of the shiek of an Egyptian village. It is believed to be not less than 6000 years old.

Montana is larger than New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York and Pennsylvania put together.

The total receipts of the New York post-office for the fiscal year ending June 30 were \$7,369,260.52, an increase over the preceding year of nearly \$600,000.

During the six months ending July 1 there were 3,838,915 pounds of meat, fish, fruit and vegetables destroyed by the health department of the city of New York.

It is estimated if there is no war and the present armed peace continues, Europe will have standing armies aggregating over 22,000,000 soldiers by the close of the century.

The first bank in the United States was the Bank of North America, chartered by congress in 1780, by the state of Pennsylvania in the following year, with a capital of \$1,000,000.

There has been considerable discussion as to who invented spectacles and who had the pleasure of wearing the first pair. The honor is generally awarded to an Italian named Salvino Armati, who died in 1317.

The largest library in the world is the Bibliothéque Nationale, Paris, founded by Louis XIV. It contains 1,400,000 volumes, 300,000 pamphlets, 175,000 manuscripts, 300,000 maps and charts and 150,000 coins and medals.

There lives a man in Webster county, W. Va., by the name of Whorton, aged 89 years, whose hair and beard are turning from white to black. He is said also to be cutting a new set of teeth. His appearance is said to indicate a man of about 40 years instead of one nearly 90.

It is said that a new industry has sprung up in France—the selling of milk frozen solid in cans. It has been discovered that milk can be kept perfectly fresh in a frozen condition for more than a month. It is frozen by means of an ordinary ice-making machine, and despatched by road, rail or steamer to its destination. The customer who purchases the frozen milk has simply to thaw it when it is required for use.

Gen Russell A Alger bolts up occasionally and he usually gives the people cause to be thankful that he was not elected president when he wanted to be. On a recent visit to New York he told a reporter of a Republican paper that he understood that a general petition of democratic manufacturers and business men would be sent to the president and congress requesting a postponement for at least two years of the tariff reform and revision, and that he believed the request would be heeded. There could be no better proof of a weak mind than this. In the first place there are no democrats who want the work of tariff reform postponed; in the second place such a request, if made, would not be heeded; in the third place, if such a course should be followed by the democratic administration the congressional elections of next year would go overwhelmingly against the party as not being worthy of public confidence. Gen Alger must be in his dotage if he really said what is reported. No sane man could make such a mistake.

MONEY TO LOAN AT 6 PER CENT ON CITY PROPERTY. M SENDERS

The senate yesterday morning took up the house bill for the repeal of the Sherman act. Wolcott of Colorado spoke against it. After considerable prolixity in which he twitted the senators on their change of views on the silver question to suit the whims of the administration, he declared Hill's speech might have been as well made against silver, as he knew free coinage was impossible by a separate act under this administration. He quoted a former utterance of Voorhees to show the inconsistency of that senator on the silver question, and declared Voorhees and Sherman for the first time were in accord, and that Sherman would be in fact chairman of the finance committee, instead of Voorhees. All the senators knew Cleveland would veto any independent silver coinage measure. He hinted that if this bill passed the free-silver men might vote against protection in any form. It seemed unaccountable in a panic that the banks should object to an increase of the volume of money. Their plan after repeal was to ask and probably get an issue of \$100,000,000 in gold bonds. The speaker then proceeded to controvert the arguments as to overproduction of silver in the world at big profits, and showed in the case of Leadville that \$104,500,000 of silver were produced at a cost of \$121,500,000, the loss being changed to only a fair profit by the value of the products. If only the silver states were concerned, they would acquiesce without protest; but it was a national question, affecting all parts of the country.

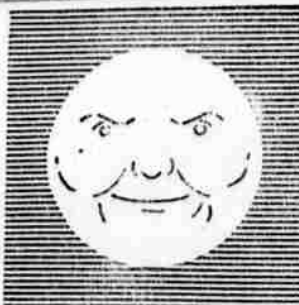
