TOO HASTY.

A subscriber to the DEMOCRAT who lives at Crawfordsville brings this paper up with a short turn for being, as he says, "a gold bug sheet," for having "come out against silver as money," etc. When asked what he had seen in the columns of the DEMOCRAT that justified him in making such statements he admitted that for several weeks past he had been so busy he had not read much, but that he had heard a couple of neighbors make these charges against the DEMOCRAT and he took it for granted that it was true. If the truth were known it would be found that these "neighbors" are not readers of the DEMOCRAT at all, but were making these statements to injure the DEMOCRAT. Now, as it is well known, we have in circulation in the United States six hundred and fifteen million dollars silver coin. The DEMOCRAT is in favor of continuing this in circulation and this is more than all the gold we have in circulation. There never has been a word in the DEMOCRAT that would justify even a suspicion that it favored the demonetization of this silver. As to the position of the DEMOCRAT with reference to further coinage of silver bullion, it has not been a matter of doubt to those who have read it. Under date of August 4th, several days before the meeting of congress in extra session, the DEMOCRAT said editorially:

The Sherman silver law should be repealed as the first act of the special session of congress. The next step should be to pass a law admitting all silver bullion, the product of our own mines, to free coinage, accompanied by the passage of stringent laws, by heavy duties or otherwise, to prevent the bringing of silver bullion or silver in any shape into this country for coinage purposes. If we can not carry our own silver at a parity with gold, we cannot carry it and all foreign silver at such parity.

There is an explicit declaration in favor of free coinage for all our own silver bullion. Nothing plainer is needed and no one who regards the truth as being preferable to falsehood would be indulging in such falsehoods as are set out above. But in order that those gentlemen who have been guilty of misrepresenting the DEMOCRAT may be still further held up to public gaze we give below an editorial which was also published in the Weekly DEMOCRAT of August 4th under the caption of "The True Solution."

Let congress do as follows and all will be well:
First, repeal the Sherman law.
Second, pass a free coinage law as to silver bullion, the product of mines in the United States only.

Third, pass very stringent laws prohibiting the importation of foreign bullion into this country, and to prohibit the coinage of foreign coins into American coins.

Fourth, pass a tariff law making such material reductions all along the line as would meet the demands of public sentiment indicated by the vote of the people.
Fifth, pass an income tax law providing for a tax on incomes of \$10,000 and upwards. Let the tax be graduated. As the income increases increase the tax by a graduated scale. We believe this is the true solution.

All of which shows where the DEMOCRAT stands on the silver question.

SPICY.

Spicy correspondence has been exchanged between Congressman "Rising Sun" Morse, of Massachusetts, and Commissioner of Pensions Lochren touching a pension case that has been rejected by the Bureau. Congressman Morse, in a long letter couched in threatening terms, practically demanded that a pension be given to W. H. Rollins, of Cannelton, Mass., the facts in whose case are given by Mr. Morse as these:

"On Nov. 15, while at work at his trade, a piece of steel flew from another workman and went almost through one of his eyes. The eye was taken out three days later. This man's remaining eye is weak and painful and the socket of the one removed is inflamed and calls for the use of medicine about it every day. The man has a sick family and has a mortgage on his little home. Now if the act of June 27, 1890, was not intended to reach a case like this, pray tell me what it was for? I helped to make that law, and I think that I understand it. I will expect you to immediately order a review and re-examination of this case, otherwise I assure you that I shall call the attention of Congress and the country to this case at the first opportunity."

Commissioner Lochren in his reply repeats Congressman Morse's statement of how the injury was inflicted, and adds:

"It is plain, therefore, that this disability is not of service origin. The report of the Medical Board gives the disability as loss of the left eye; right eye normal. No other disability. You add that the man has a sick family and a mortgage on his home, which, though misfortunes, are not pensionable and therefore irrelevant to the matter to be considered."

"To your inquiry if the act of June 27, 1890, was not intended to reach a case like this, pray tell me what it was for? You append the statement that you helped to make that law and think you understand it; so I presume you do not expect me to answer the question. You must know, however, that it applies only to those suffering from a mental or partial disability of a permanent character, incapacitating the man from performance of manual labor in such a degree as to render him unable to earn a support. The only disability in this case of a permanent character is the loss of one eye. I think you can hardly claim that that would incapacitate a man from the performance of manual labor so as to render him unable to earn a support."

"You say further that you will expect me immediately to order a review and re-examination of this case; otherwise you will call the attention of Congress and the country to it at the first opportunity. I shall

have to submit to this dire alternative, for I assure you that I will not order a review or re-examination of the case."

Commissioner Lochren then charges Congressman Morse with a misuse of the mails. He says Mr. Morse inclosed in a penalty envelope, which was sent him by the department simply for the purpose of transmitting to his constituents a report of the action of the officers in this case, a personal letter addressed from Canton, Mass., July 24, 1893, to Mr. George Smith, Taunton, Mass., in which he said:

"I trust after you have been re-examined by the Board of Examining Surgeons at Taunton that we shall shortly learn that your claim for increase has been granted, but I fear for you, for we have 'Cleveland, retrenchment and reform' now, with the confederates on top in the Pension Bureau—and their motto seems to be 'How not to do it,' and they are reviving ten pensions to every one that they grant."

Continuing Commissioner Lochren says: "I pass over your grouping of the words 'Cleveland, retrenchment and reform,' as your quotation marks indicate that you purpose to give some other demagogue the credit for the artistic work of this grouping. But your statements with the confederates on top in the Pension Bureau—and reviving ten pensions to every one they grant—are manifestly specimens of your own capacity for wilful and malignant lying. And this, with the sordid meanness which compels you to break the law and risk the penalty by using the Government envelope to convey your silly libel for the sake of saving you the two cents in postage, of which you cheated the Government, gives us a fair glimpse of your character as delineated by yourself."

"I defy your threatened vengeance and trust you will bring the matter before Congress. This correspondence will then, perhaps, adorn a page of the records and show you as you are to the admiration of future times. I myself will aid you in bringing the matter before the country."

Speaking of the increase of rates on the S. P. the Salem Journal says: There was no showing made to the commission or to the people before asking this raise and it is clearly in violation of the law of 1885 which made the existing rates just and proper. The Oregon Pacific will not stand it. The railroad company made a fatal mistake to ask any advance in rates when all farm products are low and business is depressed. The Oregon railroad commission acted hastily in letting the rates go into effect without compelling a hearing.
