

PARTISAN TO THE LAST.

Hoke Smith's pension policy is not at all popular with old soldiers, and in the G. A. R. procession in Indianapolis yesterday a song about hanging him to a "sour apple" tree was cheered to the echo. There are no doubt many fraudulent pensioners; but the pension laws are not blameable for these any more than the gospel of Christ is for frauds in the ministry. It may be necessary to weed these out, but the meritorious ones should remain.—Mountaineer.

The Mountaineer is nothing if not partisan. So intensely and narrowly partisan, too, that its bias leads it to stray away from the line of facts in order to make impressions favorable to its party. Now this little squib of the Mountaineer about that song is not told the way the press account gave it and that paper obtained its information from the press account. The Associated Press put the account this way:

"In the middle of the line the company marched singing, 'We'll hang Hoke Smith on a sour apple tree.' The sentiment was both kind and cheeked." How different that sounds from the editorial statement of the Mountaineer to the effect that "the song was cheered to the echo." This perversion is wholly wrong and we opine that Bro. Mitchell, when he thinks of it, seriously will conclude that truth, to him, in this instance was stranger than fiction. Our contemporary frankly admits that there are many fraudulent pensioners. Well, it is these self same fraudulent ones that Judge Lochren and Hoke Smith, if you please, are seeking to lop off from the pension rolls. There is not the semblance of evidence that either official would seek to drop the name of any pensioner whose pension was legally granted and who was legally entitled to it. The Mountaineer says the pension laws are not "blameable for these frauds." Well, of course not and no one so insists. But the blame lies at the door of Raum who adopted a rule for granting pensions which was in plain, palpable violation of pension law and many fraudulent pensions were granted under this rule.

It is to eradicate these frauds that Judge Lochren is putting forth his efforts, and it is safe to say that no one but a dishonest or an ignorant man could or would object to the rooting out. Nothing has a tendency to bring the whole pension system into disrepute so much as this continual objection, raised by pretended friends of old soldiers, to all and any investigation of pension frauds. Our contemporary thinks it may be necessary to weed out these fraudulent pensioners but the meritorious ones should stand. It is necessary, absolutely necessary, that these fraudulent pensions should be weeded out. The very existence of the pension system itself may depend upon it. No one has ever raised any question against meritorious pensions, hence the Mountaineer's remark upon that point is wholly superfluous.

PENNSYLVANIA MANUFACTURERS.

Being asked about tariff revision George A. Macbeth, the glass manufacturer, said: "I am willing to go before the Ways and Means Committee of Congress and show where the tariff is a detriment to the glass business."

Thomas B. Atterbury, the table glass manufacturer, said: "Andrew Carnegie does not care a farthing whether the McKinley tariff or free trade is in vogue."

David B. Oliver, the iron manufacturer, said: "Congress was pledged to change the tariff, and should do so quickly so that labor and capital can get settled."

At no time since the war have customs receipts been so low as now. The matter is causing Carlisle a good deal of worry. In the treasury last night the cash balance was reduced to \$105,000,000, inclusive of gold reserve and \$10,000,000 abraded and uncurrent and subsidiary coin. What is left of the depleted gold reserve continues to be the only cash balance in the treasury with which to pay current expenses. The receipts are now running about \$170,000 per day behind the expenditures. For the first time the import duties have fallen below the internal revenue receipts. For the fiscal year from July 1 to the present time, the government expenditures have exceeded the receipts by \$19,000,000. At this rate the deficit at the end of the year will be very large.

Senator Sherman contributed something to "tariff agitation" by suggesting that the people's verdict, twice recorded, should be disregarded. He said that our workingmen want "reasonable protection against undue competition with foreign laborers, who are miserably paid, fed, lodged and clothed." But it is not "reasonable protection" which imposes a duty, as the McKinley law does in hundreds of cases, not only more than the entire labor cost in the manufactured product, but greater than the value of the article. The sobriety of high protection is only equalled by its humbug.

Inquired of as to how the Chinese would be deported under Judge Ross' decision unless there are enough funds on hand to cover the expenses of shipping them to China, Collector of Customs Wise said that the plan decided upon is to have the steamship companies put in their bills, which would be sent on certified to the secretary of the treasury.

A dispatch from Washington says the administration has fully determined to enforce the Geary Chinese exclusion act. There is no longer any doubt on this point. Representative Geary was told so yesterday by Assistant Secretary Hamlin, by Secretary Carlisle and by President Cleveland. Geary first had a long conference with Hamlin and Carlisle. This conference was held before the cabinet meeting. When this meeting was over, Geary called upon President Cleveland at the White House by appointment arranged with the president by Secretary Carlisle. The president asked Geary very many questions, and was earnest in trying to get at all the facts in connection with the law and its effect in every section, and especially on the Pacific coast. The president indicated that he never had any intention of allowing the law to become a dead letter. He seemed to realize fully that the administration could ill afford to neglect to enforce a law passed by congress and declared constitutional by the United States supreme court. The upshot of the conference is that the question will come up for full discussion at a cabinet meeting, when the policy of the administration will be determined fully. Geary said last night that he had no fear of the result. It is more than likely that the money now available in the treasury will be used to pay the expenses of the deportation of the convicted. Celestials just so far as it will go, and by the time it is used the further amount necessary will be provided by congressional appropriation. This appropriation, it is believed, can be secured from congress, especially if the president favors it, and there seems no doubt now that he will.

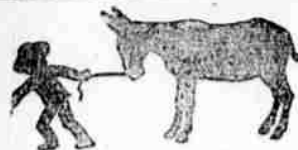
