

FEDERAL ELECTION LAW.

The democrats of the Fifty-third congress must not come back to the people without repealing the federal election law. This law is the creature of political corruption, is intended to circumscribe individual autonomy, enslave popular sovereignty and prevent the free exercise of the right of franchise. It is incompatible with just legislation, conflicts with the tenor and spirit of American jurisprudence and was passed for the purpose, and the purpose only, of resisting popular government. A bill is now before the house providing for its repeal and the manner in which republicans are opposing it is a double assurance that the law was conceived in iniquity and was enacted to prevent the people from antagonizing the republican party at the polls, no matter how deserving it was of defeat. The debate opened Thursday and the republicans set forth the claim that it would be unsafe to entrust the people of the several states with the responsibility of returning and maintaining a fair ballot and honest count. This is a libel upon the states and is as false as it is pernicious. If left to the states the counting of the ballots will devolve not upon federal spies but upon the people. The vote counted will then stand for the voter's conviction and will be counted as it was cast. The federal election law is intended to prevent this if it be necessary to do it to hold the dominant party in power. It was ex-Czar Reed who said, "Give us a law that will enable us to do our own counting, and I care not how the people vote." The law which the democrats aim to repeal is of that brand, and for this reason its repeal is essential to the welfare of popular government. The democrats being in power could use it to the same advantage as the republicans, but the democrats were elected to wipe out such infamous republican legislation, and not make use of it to subvert popular sovereignty, even though they might perpetuate themselves in power by so doing.

Many absurd things are occurring at Washington. The absurdity of all is the hearings by the ways and means committee of those manufacturers who, for years, have been enriched by taxing the masses of the whole country for their benefit. The spectacle of the committee holding meetings day by day to hear whether these protected barons desire the protective tariff system continued is too absurd to be considered in good faith. Does any one expect for a moment that any one of these beneficiaries of the vicious system will say other than that he wants the system continued? Every one knows as a matter of fact that they only alone testify in their own behalf, and speak entirely for self interest and selfish motives, is sufficient to render nugatory every statement they make in their own behalf. They simply repeat the same old thread bare story heard on every republican stump last fall. Let such hearings stop and let tariff reduction proceed.

The democrats of Pennsylvania in their platform endorse Cleveland's administration and the passage of the Wilson repeal bill by the house; call on the Pennsylvania senators to support unconditional repeal; favor a currency of gold, silver, treasury and banknotes sufficient for the needs of the country kept strictly at par, hold the republican party and the McKinley tariff responsible for the financial condition of the country; declare a prompt revision of the tariff necessary.

The Salem Journal writes a column article giving the tariff views of one Fitzpatrick of Skamokawa, Wash. (He was never heard of before on this coast.) "Col" Fitzpatrick has been largely assisted in the acquisition of a fortune by means of a protective scheme that enriches the few by taxing the many. What is the opinion of such a man worth? Nothing at all. That's all.

The disposition manifested by some of the democratic members of the house to continue to refuse to follow the majority in the matter of the federal elections bill, has made a caucus necessary. The call for a caucus has been issued for this afternoon.

The Remains of James K. Polk, the tenth president of the United States, and those of his wife have been removed from the tomb at Polk place, the old family residence in Nashville, to the state capitol grounds, and re-interred.

VOORHEES SCORES BANKERS.

Immediately after the senate met yesterday the repeal bill was taken up. Voorhees once more sought to obtain an agreement as to when a vote should be taken. The time, he said, should not be mispent instructing the public mind in regard to the organization of the senate. In doing this he addressed himself to the great body of intelligent public opinion as well as to some quarters to a dense, opaque degree of ignorance. The ignorance, in some respects, was innocent; in others, malicious. He then reviewed the history of the rules of the senate from its creation, showing that for 17 years from 1789 the senate, amongst its rules, made provision for the previous question. It was tried fully, and in 1806, when Thomas Jefferson was president, it was deliberately abandoned and never claimed or admitted from that hour to the present.

"I am now arraigned," said Voorhees, "before public opinion for not terminating this debate. As well might I be arraigned for not terminating the tide of the ocean or the northwest winds. In abandoning the cloture rule, the government of this great body has relied upon the sense of propriety, patriotism, deference to public sentiment and public interests of each senator and of the body itself, with the assurance in the minds of those then in the senate that no senator would be found to abuse the patience of this body or outrage public business or public interest. For 87 years this body has been a law sufficient unto itself. It has never been found wanting in peace or in war, so that the criticisms of a certain class will fall as harmless upon this body as they fall upon me. As far as concerns personal criticisms of myself, I may as well embrace this moment as another to say they are met with absolute stern defiance. I have served the people of Indiana many years, and I have had no explanations required when I have gone home to them, and I treat with scorn and immeasurable contempt the suggestions coming from the New York bankers or anywhere else as to the motives which govern me. I respond to that kind of criticism by saying it comes from a class whom the Savior of the world never spoke of with respect, nor do I."
