

OF COURSE.

The Herald quotes from the New Orleans Times Democrat to show that since the passage of the McKinley law which provides for the payment of a bounty of two cents a pound to all producers of sugar in the United States, there has been quite an increase in the amount produced by American producers and attributes this increase to the inducement of the bounty paid. It then adds: "This increase to show the wisdom of the law. Its argument is that as men will produce more sugar when the government pays them a bounty of two cents a pound than when such bounty is not paid, such increase in production justifies the law. Let us see how this argument, when amplified, will operate. Suppose Congress should pass a law providing that a bounty of twenty-five cents a bushel should be paid by the United States to every producer of wheat in this country. Does any one doubt for a moment that there would be a large increase in the amount of wheat produced? And, as a matter of fact, do not the farmers of Oregon stand as much in need of such a bounty as the sugar producers of Louisiana? Has any one ever proposed to provide for such a bounty to wheat growers? Suppose Congress should offer a bounty of ten cents a bushel on all oats produced. Is it not plain that the amount of oats produced would largely increase under such a stimulus? But would that fact be a justification for adopting a system of taxing the people of the whole country to pay a bounty to wheat and oat growers? And if Congress would not be justified in giving this bounty to Oregon farmers it would not be justified in giving a bounty to sugar producers. The maple sugar producers of New England and the cane sugar producers of Louisiana have been producing that article for a century without a bounty. Why at this late date should a bounty be given? The truth is this bounty system is another form of protective tariff. This paternalism is seeking a foothold in the selfishness of people should be utterly stamped out. Let the sugar bounty be utterly swept from the statute book. It is like a cancer eating into the very vitals of government itself.

CLEVELAND'S VIEWS.

Some days ago Governor Northern of Georgia wrote to President Cleveland asking him to give his views on financial matters. The president under date of Sept 25th answered as follows:

"I scarcely know how to reply to your letter of the 15th inst. It seems to me that I am plainly on record concerning the financial question. My letter accepting the nomination to the presidency, when read in connection with my message lately sent to Congress in extraordinary session, seems to me to be very explicit. I want a currency that is stable and safe in the hands of our people. I will not knowingly be implicated in a condition that will justly make me, in the least degree, answerable to any laborer or farmer in the United States for another shrinkage in the purchasing power of the dollar he has received for a full dollar's worth of the product of his toil. I not only want our currency to be of such a character as will demonstrate abroad our wisdom and good faith, thus placing it upon a firm foundation of credit among the nations of the earth. I want our financial confidence and laws relating to our currency so safe and sound that those who have money will spend and invest in business and new enterprises, instead of hoarding it. You cannot cure fright by calling it foolish and unreasonable, and you cannot prevent a frightened man from hoarding his money. I want good sound and stable money and a condition of confidence that will keep it in use.

"Within the limits of which I have written, I am a friend of silver, but I believe its proper place in our currency can only be fixed by the readjustment of our currency legislation and the inauguration of a consistent and comprehensive financial scheme. I think such a thing can only be entered upon profitably and hopefully after the repeal of the law which is charged with all our financial woes. In the present state of the public mind, this law cannot be built upon nor patched in such a way as to relieve the situation. I am, therefore, opposed to free and unlimited coinage of silver of this country alone and independently, and I am in favor of the immediate and unconditional repeal of the purchasing clause of the so-called Sherman law. I confess I am astonished by the opposition in the Senate to such prompt action as would relieve the present unfortunate situation. My daily prayer is that the delay occasioned by such opposition may not be the cause of plunging the country into a deeper depression than it has yet known, and that the democratic party may not be justly held responsible for such a catastrophe."

It will be seen from the above that the president is a friend of silver upon condition that the purchasing power of the silver shall be equal to the purchasing power of all other dollars. This is in harmony with the Chicago platform.

DESPERATE STRAITS.

The protected pets of this country are busy at work to strengthen the hold they have upon the throats of the people of this country. They spend large sums of money devising ways and means to perpetuate and irrevocably fix this system upon seventy millions of people. They can afford to spend large sums of money on this line, for this money is a part of the exorbitant profits they make out of the people. Now, they propose to unite with the silver men to defeat the repeal of the Sherman law in return for a defeat by the silver men of any reduction of the tariff. The following dispatch from Philadelphia tells their scheme:

One hundred and fifty of the leading manufacturers of this city, led by Wharton, a banker and well known financier, have drawn up and signed a proposition offering the silver senators aid in their fight against the repeal of the silver purchase, provided the latter will combine to prevent any tariff legislation. As over half of the manufacturers who signed the paper are republicans, and this community has favored repeal, this new movement has created a sensation in business circles. The circular contains three propositions to the silver senators:

First—That the United States shall admit silver bullion from American mines to coinage. In its place upon the payment by the owner of a seigniorage absorbing three-fourths of the difference between the market (London) price of bullion and its value when coined.

Second—That foreign silver shall be admitted only for coinage purposes at a seigniorage absorbing all of the difference between the market (London) price and its value when coined.

Third—That the United States shall invite at once a conference of those nations of the world which have not committed themselves to gold monometallism. This would include especially the nations of North and South America, Japan and China, and, in Europe, France, Russia and other of these nations as deeply interested as we in resisting the attempt to increase the power of gold through the degradation of the power of silver and many of them particularly those of America and eastern Asia, and those to whom we may most easily and advantageously sell the excess of our manufacturing industries. Such conference should exclude England and Germany. Its conclusion without them would direct the money policy of the world, preserve the integrity of bimetalism, and prevent the enslavement of the United States and others by the capitalist classes of the two great creditor nations.

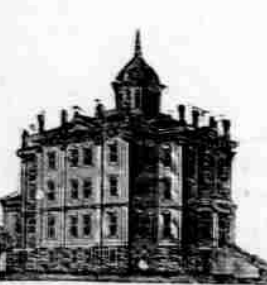
