TARIFF REVISION.

The Washington correspondent of the St. Louis Republic under the above caption says:

There was another conference of the democratic members of the ways and means committee held Friday. The general theory and principles of the bill to be reported by the committee were talked over. The conference was informal and was meant principally to give the members some idea regarding each other's opinions. There seems to be a unanimity of sentiment regarding the thorough revision of the tariff and that the bill should be one that will fully come up to the expectations of the people. Two democrats of the committee are opposed to the income tax. They are Cockran of New York and Stevens of Massachusetts.

Mr. Bynum of Indiana is somewhat in doubt. He does not like an income tax, but if it were necessary for the raising of sufficient revenue to carry on the government, economically administered, he would consent to it. There seems to be a disposition among the majority of the committee, that is a majority of the democrats of the committee, to raise \$100,000,000 through an income tax; from \$40,000,000 to \$50,000,000 through a tax on sugar; \$35,000,000 through an increase of the tax on beer, and \$25,000,000 by an increase of the tax on whiskey. With this margin of increase to go on the committee believes that there can be a very thorough cut all along the line on all the necessities of life.

It is argued that \$35,000,000 can be raised on beer very easily without increasing the cost of beer to the consumer. It is held that brewers are making more money than any other class of people in the country, and that it would be proper that they should pay tax for the support of the government accordingly. There is a very general opinion among the democrats of the committee that the sugar bounty must go, and that in its stead a duty of three-fourths of a cent a pound on refined and one half cent a pound on raw sugar should be enacted.

It is argued that with the tax at that rate from \$10,000,000 to \$50,000,000 in revenue to the government can be raised. On the question of an income tax the committee will think longest and hardest. They expect a pretty general opposition to an income tax from the east and a pretty general demand for an income tax from the west and south. Representative Breckinridge of Arkansas has charge of the democratic side of the sub-committee on income tax. The expectation now is that the bill when reported will have an income tax provision.

The bill will be read and in all likelihood reported to the house during the first week in November. About six weeks will be allowed for debate and discussion and amendment of the measure in the house, when it is expected it will pass with every democrat in the body recording his vote for it.

It is the intention of the committee to prepare the measure with infinite care. The bill is not to be a makeshift, but one that will be expected to stand for 50 years without serious alteration. The principle of protection will be entirely ignored and a purely revenue tariff provided for. All the democrats in the committee are at work on the measure, and as fast as schedules are prepared they will be turned over to Mr. Wilson and Mr. Bynum, who will have charge of the general construction and phraseology of the bill.

EXTRAVAGANT NONSENSE.

It is no time to talk nonsense about the financial situation. People are suffering from the depression and are entitled to relief as soon as it can be had. Nonsense, lack of logic, false reasoning, will not assist in the solution of the problem. The Evening Telegram will become cognizant of this fact sooner or later, we hope sooner. In an editorial, Monday, it says: "Congress has no power in the premises except within the limitations of the constitution which makes it imperative upon that body to provide for the coinage of both gold and silver and to fix the ratio of one to the other." Now, we beg to say to the Telegram editor the constitution does not make it imperative upon congress to "coin both gold and silver and to fix the ratio of one to the other." It does not say that congress shall coin either gold or silver, or both. It has but one provision in reference to coinage and that is the one that provides that "congress shall have power to coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin." Under this provision congress has power to coin money from gold

silver, copper, nickel, steel, or any other material it may choose. Congress may pass a law to discontinue the coinage of gold at any time it may think the public welfare demands it. Likewise a law providing for the coinage of any other metal into money may be repeated. Congress has unlimited control of the subject of coining money and regulating its value, [making it a legal tender.] Congress may pass laws on this subject and repeat them as it may other laws. Again the Telegram says:

They, (the framers of the constitution of the United States,) merely selected the two metals most in use among the nations of the world, both of which had been recognized as money from time immemorial, and directed congress to provide for the coinage of the two metals without discriminating against either. When congress shall have performed its constitutional obligations, the money question will be settled.

Once for all, we desire to inform the Telegram that the framers of the constitution did not direct congress to provide for the coinage of the two metals without discrimination against either or otherwise. We have no doubt that the framers of the organic law had it in mind that congress would make use of both silver and gold in coining money, but they wisely left the whole matter open so that congress might use other metal as well as gold and silver if it chose to do so. The fact that congress has coined money out of copper and nickel shows the extent of their power. We trust the Telegram may be more accurate in its statements of constitutional provisions hereafter.
