GOOD EVENING.

Observed by EVERYBODY.—The Adelaide, Australia, Advertiser is also "on to" Oregon's fruit. It says: Among the fruit raising states are Oregon, Colorado, Washington, Montana, New York, Florida, Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, Michigan, New York and California. These Oregon makes an exceptionally good display, justifying a "bit of blow" in the form of amusing inscriptions telling world that "there are two bites to a cherry in Oregon," and similar wondrous. The cherries are shown weighing 3 pounds, peaches weighing over 4 pounds, cherries measuring inches in circumference, and peaches considerably larger than cricket balls. The cherries are unexcelled for size, firmness, flavor keeping properties. The evaporation apples, peaches and apricots are largely grown in the state, the use of this form of export fruits increasing by leaps and bounds throughout the United States.

Dr. L. I. Darrin of Portland, well known all over the coast, is being sued by Mary R. Wady for \$20,000 for breach of promise and seduction under promise of marriage.

Another enterprise has been started here in the shape of a new meat market, a gentleman by the name of Rogers, we believe is the proprietor. —Harrisburg Courier.

P. J. Smiley, the printer, is doing a big business, regardless of hard times. He gives as one of the principal reasons judicious advertising. Attention to business and good work also play an important part in it.

Seven tramps got into a box car at Albany a few days ago intending to go south. The box car went out towards Lebanon, and the tramps were obliged to return on foot from a Tallman.

Athena and Adams farmers are beginning to sell their wheat. In two days the latter part of last week, at Athena, 16,000 bushels were sold for cash at 35¢ and 37¢, and since then there have been later transactions. —E.O.

The first incorporation articles of the month were filed with the secretary of state yesterday. Harry V. Gates, Duane Rankin, Helen M. Gates and W. E. Puyan filed articles incorporating the Hillsboro Electric Light & Water Co. with capital of \$30,000.

J. B. Tins, of Arlington, formerly of Albany, has just returned home from Chicago, where he disposed of 18 good heavy horses, at an average of \$347 per head, over expenses, and got back with \$62.50 net profit. He says a number of others met with even worse success, several of them coming out in debt.

In its council proceedings a Salem paper says: The bills of Timon Ford and W. M. Kaiser for \$500 and D. Arcy & Bingham also \$500 for legal service in the case of the big bridge contractors against the county, were laid over for explanation, it not being understood by the court that both law firms were in the case.

Tramps are having an easy thing of it now travelling over the country. The S. P. allows them to ride on freights provided they behave themselves, and a great many who are not tramps take advantage of this fact. One man at the depot admitted that he had money; but said he did not propose to spend it even for board.

A subscription was taken up for Mrs. C. E. Brown the first of the week and she left for Independence Wednesday. Mrs. Brown is a hard working woman, and if her husband, who is now in jail in Albany for abusing a child, will keep away she will be able to provide amply for herself and little ones. —Harrisburg Courier.

Depositors of the Linn County Bank generally should sign the agreement by which the bank can be opened. They will get their money just about as quick, and it will prove of great benefit generally to the community as well as to the bank. Were each one to refuse to do so, nothing could be done. The bank certificates, bearing 6 per cent interest, will be easily gotten rid of if the money is needed, as times improve.

LEBANON.—Mrs. Stubblefield left yesterday for San Rafael, Calif., where she will spend the winter with Rev. Eccleston and wife.

Rev. Eccleston and wife have removed from Roseburg to San Rafael, California, and he will attend the Presbyterian theological seminary at that place.

Only two hop growers in this vicinity have sold their crops, all the others are holding for better prices. During the past week Lamberson & Wilkes bought all the hops in the Brownsville district, consisting of 300 bales, paying 17 cents per pound. They also bought 40 bales near Halsey.

Word was brought to town yesterday that six families from Colorado on the way to this valley were in destitute circumstances on the road somewhere this side of the summit. The city authorities resolved to investigate the matter and furnish assistance if needed. Councilman Cruse volunteered to go and meet the party, and he is authorized to supply their immediate needs from the nearest trading point. We had learned nothing further at the time of going to press. —Advance.

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## MISCELLANEOUS

Among the funny things of the week at the Columbian exposition was a little incident at the single-tax congress while A. H. Stephenson, the single-tax leader of Philadelphia, was making an eloquent onset upon Henry George for his Chinese restriction ideas. He had just referred to the doors being shut against the Chinese, and with impassioned voice asked: "Where did you get those doors? Did the Creator give them to us? Who gave us this country, anyway?" To this question a voice in the crowd promptly called out with great damage to the flow of eloquence: "We stole it from the Indians."

The Salem Independent says: Nobody doubts that the state of Oregon will before long be in a position to cash all warrants at their face, together with accumulated interest; but at the same time it is impossible to get money on them at present, without an enormous sacrifice. I assure you I was very reluctant to make a rule of this kind, but the conditions of the market are such as to make it imperative. Trusting you will look at this in the proper light and also understand that this rule applies generally.
