GOOD EVENING.

OREGON PACIFIC ORDERS.—October 14th the following orders were made by the Circuit court at Corvallis: The receiver of the Oregon Pacific railroad was directed to issue certificates to the employees of the road covering pay due for August and September, which certificates are to be dated Sept. 1, 1893, bearing 8 per cent interest and be made payable to bearer.

Permission was granted to Receiver Hadley to bring suit against the Portland Flouring Mills association for an alleged indebtedness to the said road.

Receiver Hadley was authorized to visit eastern cities as requested by bondholders and certificate holders, for the purpose of conferring with interested parties in regard to the property of the railroad, expenses to be paid by money coming into the hands of the receiver provided they do not exceed \$750.

The sheriff was directed to offer for sale, at public auction, all property whatsoever belonging to the O. P. R. R. or W. V. & C. R. R. in accordance with a decree entered April 13, 1891, and subsequent orders, at a day not later than the 15th of December.

THE Y. M. C. A.—Last evening the annual meeting of the board of directors of the Y. M. C. A. was held at the hall. The reports of the officers and committees showed a healthy growth. Active preparations are being made for the winter's campaign. An orchestra has been formed to assist in entertainments, and now consists of O. C. McFarland, George Acheson, Collins Elkins, Clem Irvine, George Washburn, Charles Anderson, Ed Long and Charles Sears. A class in gymnastics is being organized and it is proposed to make this department an interesting one. A new building is a Bible class meeting once a week. The new officers are: Prof. W. J. Crawford, president; Wm. Fortnall, vice president; Prof. W. H. Lee, recording secretary; E. M. Horton, treasurer.

CHAMBERLAIN FOR GOVERNOR.—The Salem Journal says: W. P. Miller of Klammath Agency, a brother of John F. Miller with whom he has large land interests, is in the city. He is interested in a lawsuit before Judge Barnett, and is a prominent rancher in Southern Oregon. He says John F. Miller will be at Salem in a few weeks. Beef steers bring 2½ cts, cows 1½ cts off the range for California market. Horses are very cheap. He says Penneyer and Hermann have many friends among the people and are both great vote getters. His choice for governor on a fusion ticket is Attorney General Chamberlain who he believes will be the democratic nominee and would poll a big vote.

POOR YEAR FOR CANNERS.—The Eugene cannery has completed the work of drying prunes for the season of 1893. The product dried amounts to about 25,000 pounds of the article ready for market, the green fruit amounting to about 118,000 pounds. At Dr. Sharples' dryer we are reliably informed there were 60,000 pounds of dried prunes, or 230,000 pounds of green fruit. In one day the Dr. turned out four tons of dried fruit and he is confident that with proper facilities he can easily dry five tons per day. The cannery will probably make a short run during the season. This has been a very poor year for canners. Nearly every one of these institutions will lose money this year.—Eugene Guard.

ANovel Spectacle.—At Goodhue's wood yard, near the big bridge a good, able bodied woman is earning a living by helping run a wood saw. POORLY PAID.—Ex-Governor Francis, of Missouri, in an address said of the services to a community of the home newspaper: "Each year the local paper gives from \$500 to \$5000 in free lines to the community in which it is located. No other agency can or will do this. The editor, in proportion to his means, does more for his town than any ten men, and in all fairness with men he ought to be supported, not because you like him or admire his writings, but because the local paper is the best investment a community can make. It may not be brilliantly edited nor crowded with thoughts, but financially it is of more benefit to a community than a teacher or a preacher. Understand me, I do not mean morally or intellectually, but financially, and yet on the moral question you will find most of the local papers on the right side. Today the editor of the home paper does more for the least money than any other man on earth."

A SAD CASE.—Judge Hubbard is in receipt of a letter from E. G. Haseltine, an old soldier who resides at Mehama. Haseltine has applied to the Governor for aid, and has been informed that the state cannot act in such matters, but that there is a county fund for the aid of indigent soldiers. His case demands the attention of his brother veterans, as he is disabled by sickness from earning a support for his wife and child. Mr. Haseltine says he has applied for a pension, but does not believe he will get it from this democratic administration. We believe he has this administration sized up wrong, and that if he is entitled to a pension he will receive one. In the meantime, he should receive such aid from the indigent soldiers' fund as he is entitled to.—Salem Democrat.
