CLEVELAND'S BIFETALISM.

In their speeches in the senate, the silver senators seek to weaken the cause of repeal by making it appear that Mr. Cleveland is hostile to bimetalism. In his first effort Senator Vest made the astonishing assertion concerning the message that the president had failed "in this great state paper to say one word in regard to bimetalism." This, he said, "means that he considers the free coinage of silver at any ratio so impracticable that it does not need the executive notice."

Other opponents of repeal have repeated this charge even since the president's letter to Governor Northern.

Mr. Cleveland's first criticism of the Sherman law in the message is that its operation, if continued, "would destroy the parity between the two metals by establishing a discrimination in favor of gold." Again he says that if the law is not repealed the exhaustion of the gold supply in the treasury will bring about a condition of things in which "gold and silver must part company and the government must fail in its established policy to maintain the two metals on a parity with each other."

Still again he says: If, as many of its friends claim, silver ought to occupy a larger place in our currency and the currency of the world through general international co-operation and agreement, it is obvious that the United States will not be in a position to gain a bearing in favor of such an arrangement so long as we are willing to continue our attempt to accomplish the result single handed.

It appears clearly from an attentive reading of the message that it was inspired by the most earnest desire for a rational bimetalism so safeguarded as forever to maintain the two metals on a parity not only in our own coinage but in the currency of the civilized world.

In the Northern letter he was still more explicit. He there wrote:

I am a friend of silver, but I believe its proper place in our currency can only be fixed by a readjustment of our currency legislation and the inauguration of a consistent and comprehensive financial scheme. I think such a thing can only be entered upon profitably and hopefully after the repeal of the law which is charged with all our financial woes. In the present state of the public mind this law cannot be built upon nor patched in such a way as to relieve the situation.

The president is a bimetalist as those men are not who desire free silver coinage under conditions which must drive gold out of the country and establish a silver monometallism. He wants "our currency to be of such a character that all kinds of dollars should be of equal purchasing power," and on that basis alone can there be actual bimetalism anywhere. On any other there must be monometallism either of gold or of silver. In any future and sincere endeavor to adjust our currency to the needs of the people, the advocates of a rational and safe bimetalism will have nothing to fear at the hands of the president.

HE ONLY PROTESTED

Mr. Bryan of Nebraska scouts the tales of his withdrawal from the democratic party. He remains a democrat until the party becomes monometallist. Mr. Bryan will therefore be a democrat until funeral services mark his last public appearance.

There are no signs that the party will be enticed from its ancient faith in hard money and a double standard. Disturbances in the relations of the metals since the old days when we could use either gold or silver as the standard, according to preference, have produced differences of opinion among democrats upon the best plan of returning to free coinage. But no good democrat is deceived by the gold or the silver monometallists.

A young democrat like Mr. Bryan, actuated by generous enthusiasm for the old principles, will strive to combat the idea that money can be doled out to the people by the paternal hand of the central government. For the sake of justice and uniformity the government controls the standard. As a business establishment it should protect its own credit with metallic reserves against its outstanding liabilities. Having declared the standard it can let the people get their own money and use it as they please.

Mr. Bryan can spread the true democratic gospel by talking in favor of a bimetallic standard and liberty for the people in money issues. We are glad Nebraska democrats have the talented young advocate with them for life.

PROTECTION FOR TRADE.

Western and Southern staple producers never needed a tariff for revenue more than now. A tariff for revenue is equivalent to a reduced cost of transportation both ways. Every farmer knows what reduced transportation charges do for the movement of crops and the purchase of goods.

Farm debts never pressed more heavily and farm profits were never more unsatisfactory. Wheat prices drag. Cotton is no better, and the big packing houses have claimed that they must cut down expenses. These are the three great sources of our export trade.

For 70 years the tariff question has been the same—how much the staple producers should be charged for the support of government and the maintenance of certain lines of manufacture. Not only how much actual money they should pay, but how much restriction of trade they could stand.

Radical additions to taxation and restriction have been made without notice to the staple producers. The imposition of new burdens in 1883 and 1890 was made when all the pledges out were for reduction.

In spite of that habitual treatment the agricultural States do not ask for an immediate blotting out of all protection. Their expectation is that a Democratic Ways and Means Committee will present a bill whose guiding purpose will be the encouragement of trade and production. The raising of revenue necessitates some protection as long as we have a tariff of any kind. We can stand that much protection, and not a great deal more.

It has always been the case heretofore, when a tariff bill is in course of preparation, that the country hears a great deal about the effect on the protected industries. This time we have a right to hear less about that and more about cheap transportation and the encouraging effect on the export industries.

When the Ways and Means Committee in its experiments gets to a bill for the merchants, farmers, school teachers, preachers, lawyers, carpenters, masons and blacksmiths it can stop right there. That bill will be good enough.—St. Louis Republic.

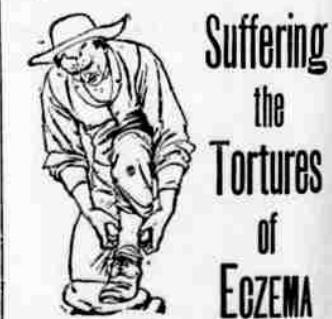
