GOVERNOR BOIES OF IOWA SPEAKS.

Mr. Jackson, the republican candidate for governor of Iowa, asked Governor Boies, his democratic opponent, the other day the following question:

"Will you as the nominal candidate for governor, and the real candidate of your party for United States senator, say whether you believe in the repeal of the Sherman law as now proposed in congress, or whether you believe in free silver coinage as proposed by another branch of the democratic party?"

The governor answered as follows:

"While the question assumes what no one has a right to assume, that I am a candidate of my party for the United States senate, and only a nominal candidate for the office of governor, and relates to a matter on which no vote of the electors of Iowa in this campaign can have any effect. I will for the purpose of putting Mr. Jackson in a position where he will feel under obligations to answer the questions propounded by myself to him, endeavor to answer the same fully and frankly by saying that if I were in a position to vote upon the question of a repeal of the purchasing clause of the Sherman bill, I should vote for it because I believe it has done more than all other causes combined to bring about our present financial embarrassment. But in doing so I should advise no part of my most earnest desire to see some plan adopted by which BOTH GOLD AND SILVER CAN BE EQUALLY FREELY COINED AS A STANDARD MONEY of the country with safeguards that will at all times maintain the parity of the two metals."

Mr. Jackson then asked: "Do you believe as the democratic platform last year declared, that all protection is a fraud and unconstitutional, and will you if elected to the United States senate vote to repeal the McKinley law?"

The governor then answered as follows:

"The gentleman again assumes what neither he or myself have any right to assume, that I am a candidate of my party for United States senator, and I am only prepared to answer this question in the hope that it will aid in inducing Mr. Jackson to answer those of vastly greater importance to the electors of Iowa which I have propounded to him. For this purpose alone I will say: I do believe that any law which has for its purpose only the object of protection to certain classes of industries is a fraud and unconstitutional, because it is impossible to protect any specific class of our people in our business enterprises without at the same time imposing on all other classes a burden precisely equal to the advantage conferred and I do not believe congress has the constitutional power to provide by law that one class shall be protected in its business affairs at the expense of another class. It does not follow from this that no protection is to be afforded the manufacturing industries of this country. We must have tariff laws to raise revenue to carry on the government, and however adjusted they will necessarily afford protection to the home industries. This, however, will be an incident, instead of the prime purpose of such laws. To the question of whether or not I would if a United States States senator vote to repeal the McKinley bill, I unhesitatingly answer that I would, and I would further vote to supply its place with a fair and reasonable tariff law for revenue only."

Having answered as fully as I am able to do so, the questions propounded by Mr. Jackson, I now respectfully repeat my questions to him."

The Evening Telegram has become so wild as to declare that a majority of the senate is opposed to the unconditional repeal of the Sherman law. Then why do Teller, Wolcott, Allen, Pugh, Morgan and other obstructionists labor day and night in filibustering warfare to prevent the senate's taking a vote on the repeal bill? Why should Senator Allen who is opposed to repeal make a "speech" thirteen hours long to prevent a vote when that vote would defeat repeal? We are not surprised at this statement of the Telegram for it is in harmony with its course during the last two months.

There is more talk about compromise in the senate on the silver question. The proposed bill extends the provisions of the present silver purchase law to January 1, 1895, with a reduction of the monthly purchase to 2,500,000 ounces per month, and for the coinage immediately of the reformed silver in the treasury. The matter of the bond issue is still open. The most favorably considered proposition contemplated the purchase of silver at the present rate till 92,000,000 ounces are purchased.
