GOOD EVENING.

A 1000 FIRE.

Saturday evening about 9:30 o'clock the fire bell rang as if for business. The south eastern sky was ablaze, and it looked as if there was a conflagration only a few blocks away. An investigation revealed the fact that it was in the country, and that the large barn of F. O. Hoffman was entirely consumed with all its contents. About nine o'clock a tramp was at the house and asked for the privilege of remaining all night, which was refused, when the man left cursing Mr. Hoffman and shaking his fists. Mr. Hoffman not liking the situation went to a neighbor, Mr. Jas. Irwin, to go over and stay with him. He had only been gone a short time when the barn was discovered in flames. On his return the fire was so hot that he could not get inside the barnyard. About 70 tons of hay, some belonging to other persons, some grain, a large stock of farming utensils of different kinds, 25 pairs of portable scales, of which Mr. Hoffman had the sale, four fine head of horses, two cows and some hens, were destroyed. The value of the property was at least \$1000.

An insurance of \$2745 was carried in the Imperial, C. G. Burkhardt agent. It was originally carried in the State of Salem, but was one of the policies taken out of that company on Sept. 7, on account of the fight being made by the Pacific Insurance Union and transferred to the Imperial.

Meeting of Creditors.

MILL CITY, Or., Oct. 21.—The Oregon Pacific creditors held another meeting here today. Report of committee read and accepted and same committee continued with full authority to act according to their best judgment. It is not known at this writing just what course they intend to pursue, as this part of the program was not made public. Wm. Burns was seen after the meeting but refused to give any information on the subject. On being asked as to the probable outcome he said that the road would undoubtedly be sold as ordered, as there were three bidders now in sight.

THE JOB BANK.—W. T. Branch, the expert appointed to examine the books of Hamilton & Job has reported that there was nothing to show any misappropriation of funds in any respect reflecting on the honesty of the bankers. The expense of running the bank for six years was \$28,925.44, which certainly indicate some good sized stories. The receipts were \$38,662.73, and losses on long and short account \$2,633.32, showing an income of only \$7,098.96 for six years, and yet the creditors will only receive about 50 cents on the dollar.

A number of lawless depredations have been committed up in this country of late.

About six weeks ago the residence of J. W. Brown of Niagara was blown up and Brown hung in effigy over the ruins.
