THE CRY FOR "MORE MONEY"

We print elsewhere an apparently honest letter from Alabama, giving an explanation of the attitude of the southern senators who oppose repeal.

It is claimed by the writer that "Southern people need more money." They "have no interest in silver as a coin merely, but they have been taught to believe that by its increased coinage money will be more plentiful." They therefore stand with the silver men who are interested in selling or minting bullion in the hope of getting "more money."

It is hard to reason with men who are deaf to the lessons of experience and blind to existing facts.

The government has been buying silver and piling it uselessly in its vaults for three years past at the rate of 2,250 tons a year. It has issued in round numbers \$150,000,000 in treasury notes. For several years previous to 1890 it coined silver freely on enforced purchases every month.

Has all this made money plenty? Has it been plenty in the sense of being easy to get—which is what the writer means—the past four months, during the culmination of this policy?

There were in the treasury on Oct 1 392,409,000 silver dollars, which the people either would not or could not keep in circulation.

With over \$200,000,000 more money in circulation on October 1 than there was a year ago, it is harder to get. Why? Is there any other reason than that confidence is impaired and the stability of the currency threatened by the policy of silver purchases?

The cessation of silver purchases has no relation to coinage, free or otherwise. No silver has been coined for three years. The Sherman law has made silver cheaper and money scarcer. And yet the southern senators filibuster against the right of the majority to rule and of the senate to vote on the repeal of a law which has no defenders, in a purblind pursuit of "more money."

It is the very perfection of Bourbonism. It is one of those political blunders that are worse than crime.—World.

It is said that a compromise of the silver question has been practically agreed upon by the democrats of the senate. The proposed compromise measure extends the provisions of the present silver purchase act until October 1, 1894, provides for the coinage of the silver now in the treasury and the retirement of all paper currency, except silver certificates, below \$10. The bill also provides for the coinage of silver to be purchased in the future. There is no reference whatever in the bill to the bond question. Opinions differ as to the time when the bill will be presented in the senate. It may be handed in Tuesday or even earlier if it shall prove acceptable to the majority.

From May 1 to September 23, national banks took out \$29,000,000 in circulation. The total national bank circulation is now, in round figures, \$304,000,000. By the law of 1892 national bank notes cannot be retired in excess of \$3,000,000 a month, so that even if the banks retired all the \$29,000,000 taken out the contraction would be extended over nearly a year.

The Brookville Democrat solves a problem in this short hand Democratic way. "Protegees say the foreigner who sends in goods to this country for sale pays the tax. Let us see how this idea works in the matter of imported cigars: Last year we imported cigars valued at \$2,769,011. On there a duty of \$3,339,469 was paid. According to this claim that the foreigner pays the duty, the makers of these cigars gave us their goods for nothing, and paid us \$770,459 besides for taking them off their hands. Could any a' sordidly go further? Yes the man over 21 years of age who avers that the citizen does not pay the tariff tax, is a compound absurdity.

Mr. Cleveland's position toward the November elections is a peculiar one. If they go republican it will be a rebuke to the Cleveland administration. Yet in Ohio and New York democratic success will be a vindication for the opponents of the administration. In both of these states the democratic ticket represents the anti-Cleveland element. Whether the democrats be winners or losers, it will be a black eye for Cleveland in either event.—Telegraph.

REVENUE AT THE LEAST COST.

The total ordinary expenditures of the government for 1892 were \$345,023,339. The receipts for that year were \$354,937,784—an excess over expenditures of \$9,914,454. Of the receipts of the government \$177,452,964 were raised by customs duties, \$153,971,072 through the internal revenue and \$23,513,742 in other ways.

The internal revenue is raised from spirits, tobacco, fermented liquors, and a very small amount from penalties for violation of the revenue laws. These things are all luxuries, and generally harmful luxuries, and the democratic congress should not, and will not, reduce the taxes from this source. There is no probability of any reduction from any source except from imports, and so it is well to understand that our government has a revenue of \$177,452,964, independent of the tariff.

How to reduce the tariff without reducing the revenues below the needs of the government is a question for congress to decide. Unless some new source of revenue is found, as, for instance, an income tax, about the same amount will have to be raised through customs duties as is raised in that manner now. The only thing that congress ought to consider is the question: "How can this be done with the least cost to the people?"

The republican idea of a tariff has always been protection. The democratic idea is revenue. These ideas are directly the reverse of each other. The republicans have always favored imposing a tariff on any commodity for the reason that it competed with the home product. If the democrats are consistent, that will be with them a reason for placing such commodity on the free list or imposing a very small duty on it. The reason is plain. The democratic idea is to take nothing from the people except what is paid to the government. A commodity which is not produced in this country and cannot be, can, by being taxed, give to the people through the government every cent they pay out. Not one dollar will go to foster any favored industry, while the revenue derived from a tariff on any commodity which is produced in this country will be divided between the government and the home producer of that commodity, and if the tariff is high enough to prevent the import of that commodity the entire revenue from it will go to the home producer. The people will be taxed and the government will not get one cent.

The McKinley bill was intended to decrease the revenue of the government. That it had that effect is shown by the fact that the receipts from customs amounted to \$229,668,585 the year before it went into effect, and, in two years, they had decreased to \$177,452,964, a decrease under higher duties of \$52,215,621 in two years. Can any one fear then that a reduction of these duties, made with an eye to revenue only, will decrease the revenues of the government? Is it not plain that a judicious reduction will increase the revenue?

The total output of canned salmon from British Columbia canneries this season is estimated at 548,000 cases. The Alaska output is 300,000 cases, a decrease of 20 per cent from last year.

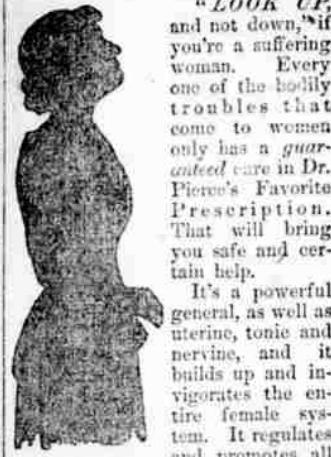
