KINDERGARTEN ASSOCIATION.—A good deal of interest has been manifested in Kindergarten work of late. A desire to form an association seems to be apparent. A meeting for this purpose has been appointed to meet next Friday afternoon, Oct. 27th, at 3:30 o'clock in the college, to which all former and present patrons and friends of the Kindergarten, and all interested in child training, are cordially and earnestly invited. The object of this meeting is to make the Kindergarten a permanent institution in Albany. "Between three and six years—from nursery to school—is the kindergarten age, when the foundation of future character is laid and the right or wrong impetus given the child's life. In short it is the most vital, receptive and fruitful time in which to perfect the coming man."

THOSE SUBSCRIPTION CASES.—The case of the city against F. L. Such for \$2000, subscription to the bridge fund, was recently settled by Mr. Such paying \$1500. AFTER THE OREGON PACIFIC

Several days ago the DEMOCRAT published an item to the effect that Superintendent Fields and an engineer of the S. P. were examining the O. P. property here with a view to purchasing the road. Some thought it was merely talk. The following dispatch from San Francisco, dated Oct. 24th, confirms it: It is said here that the Southern Pacific company is desirous of controlling the Oregon Pacific railway and tributary water lines which will be placed on the market in the early part of next month. The Southern Pacific has recently had Division Superintendent L. R. Field, of the Oregon division of the Southern Pacific system, looking over the Oregon Pacific road. Mr. Field has been accompanied by an engineering expert and it is reported that the Southern Pacific people are favorably impressed with the Oregon Pacific's plant and that there are possibilities of the former making the purchase. Other railroad companies, however, are interested in the northern road. One of them is the Great Northern railway company, James J. Blair, of Blairville, N. J., and many times millionaire, one of the largest shareholders in the Oregon Pacific. Blair is also one of the principal backers of the Great Northern and it is for his line that he is making a fight to control the Oregon Pacific. It is the intention of the Great Northwestern to make connections with the Oregon line, thus allowing it a rail and ocean route to San Francisco. The third party in the fight is the representative of numerous small shareholders on the Oregon Pacific. If the Southern Pacific should get in control it will have the same hold on the Willamette valley that it now has on San Joaquin valley in California.
At present the Oregon Pacific operates a line of steamers on the Willamette river which holds the Southern Pacific down to low rates. General Agent B. R. Vaughn of the Oregon Pacific said: "The plant of the Oregon Pacific is valued at about \$15,000,000. There is \$250,000 in labor claims that will have to be satisfied in addition to the outstanding receiver's certificates amounting to about \$600,000." The road is bonded for \$25,000 a mile. The acquisition of proprietorship of the Oregon Pacific system by the Southern Pacific would give the latter company supremacy over the whole of Western Oregon from the California state line to Portland.

He writes to a friend in this city that nearly everybody is anxious to come to Oregon, and will do so as soon as a purchaser for their property can be found.—Oregonian

Leake D. Wolfard, of Tacoma, who has several thousand acres in wheat a few miles north of Colfax, states that after a thought inspection of his crop and other friends in every part of the country, that it would be hard work to get one-third of a crop from Whitman. He places the loss of the country at 6,500,000 bushels. J. W. Arrasmith, speaker of the house of representatives, says the loss will go above 7,000,000, for very little east of Colfax will be saved.—Ex.

Mr. Wm. Province returned about two weeks ago from an extended trip in the middle west. Mr. Province went east about a year ago with a band of horses, which animals he disposed of in Wallace, Kansas. While away Mr. Province traveled through Kansas, Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, and other middle west territory. He says that the people of eastern Oregon, and Creek country in particular, are better off financially than they think.—News. Much more they could be said of the Willamette Valley.

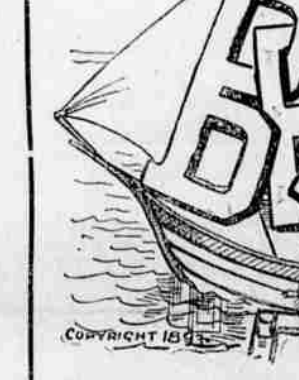
