

FINANCIAL LEGISLATION.

The following is the Wilson bill which carried in the house by a vote of 230 to 110:

AN ACT to repeal a part of an act, approved July 14, 1890, entitled, "An act directing the purchase of silver bullion and the issue of treasury notes thereon, and for other purposes." Be it enacted, etc., That so much of the act approved July 14, 1890, entitled, "An act directing the purchase of silver bullion and the issue of treasury notes thereon, and for other purposes," as directs the secretary of the treasury to purchase from time to time silver bullion to the aggregate amount of 4,500,000 ounces, or so much thereof as may be offered in each month at the market price thereof, not exceeding one dollar for 371.25 grains of pure silver, and to issue in payment for such purchases treasury notes of the United States, be, and the same is hereby repealed; but this repeal shall not impair or affect in any manner the legal tender quality of the standard silver dollars heretofore coined; and the faith and credit of the United States are hereby pledged to maintain the parity of the standard gold and silver coins of the United States at the present legal ratio as may be established by law.

When the above bill was sent to the senate the finance committee of that body substituted the following known as the Voorhees bill which is now the pending repeal bill in the senate:

"That so much of the act approved July 14, 1890, entitled, 'An act directing the purchase of silver bullion and the issue of treasury notes, and for other purposes,' as directs the secretary of the treasury to purchase from time to time silver bullion to the aggregate amount of 4,500,000 ounces, or so much thereof as may be offered in each month at the market price thereof, not exceeding \$1 for 371.25 grains of pure silver, and to issue in payment for such purchases treasury notes of the United States, be, and the same is hereby repealed. And it is hereby declared to be the policy of the United States to continue the use of both gold and silver as standard money, and to coin both gold and silver into money of equal intrinsic and exchangeable value, such equality to be secured through international agreement or by such safeguards of legislation as will insure the maintenance of a parity in the value of coins of the two metals and the equal power of every dollar at all times in the markets and in the payment of debts. And it is hereby further declared that the efforts of the government should be steadily directed to the establishment of such a safe system of bimetalism as will maintain at all times the equal power of every dollar coined or used by the United States in the markets and in the payment of debts."

The senate's committee on foreign relations met yesterday to consider the Chinese question, with a view to action upon the house bill amending the Geary law so as to extend for six months the time in which Chinese laborers can register. Secretary Gresham is in attendance and affording counsel. It is understood he was questioned upon the attitude of the Chinese government upon the subject. The committee considered the question of the cost of the deportation of the Chinese residents of the country, which the secretary of the treasury places at \$10,000,000. The committee did not reach any conclusion concerning the bill, and it is quite probable that it will not be reported to the senate before the beginning of the regular session in December. There is a disposition on the part of the committee to investigate all the facts bearing upon the question and also to give the people of the western coast an opportunity to be heard thoroughly.

Senator Sherman says he has no intention to offer an amendment to the repeal bill for the issue of \$200,000,000 of bonds to strengthen the gold reserve at this session. At the regular session, however, he will introduce a bill for that purpose. It is the general opinion that a bond amendment to the present bill would not pass, and it might endanger the passage of the bill itself. Peffer denies that the populists intend filibustering against repeal.

The republicans of Iowa have just one ground upon which to predicate the hope of electing their candidate for governor this year, and that is that the populist vote may be sufficiently largely drawn from the democrats to defeat governor Hoies. We think some democrats in Iowa fear that that may be the result of the election.

A French authority on cooking gives these rules for testing the heat of an oven: Try it with a piece of white paper. If too hot the paper will blacken or blaze up; if it becomes a lighter brown, it is fit for pastry; if it turns dark yellow, it is fit for bread and the heavier kinds of cake; if light yellow the oven is ready for sponge cake and the lighter kinds of desserts.

If check were one of the necessary qualifications to success in producing effective partisan editorials our good brother Mitchell of the *Mountaineer* would be a booming success. That paper will tell its readers that it is in favor of a majority of the people ruling. It will claim that the will of the people, clearly and intelligently expressed upon any given issue, should become the law of the land. It will admit that the rule of the majority is of the very essence of our form of government. Yet, in the face of all this it has the bold check to ask a democratic congress to openly and ruthlessly thwart the clearly, definitely, and intelligently expressed will of the people by refusing to give them that tariff legislation for which they voted by a million majority last fall. The will of a large majority of our people is that a material reduction in tariff rates should be made. This expression of public will was arrived at after five years of careful, painstaking investigation of the whole subject of tariff legislation by the whole people. It is safe to say that no subject has been so thoroughly and universally investigated by the masses of the people in the history of the government as the subject of protective tariff, and no condemnation was ever more emphatic and decided than that arrived at by the people last fall. Then, why should the *Mountaineer* set itself up against the voice of the people. The truth is this: "Protection," so-called is not now in the interest of the people. It benefits the classes at the expense of the masses. It is not for majorities but for minorities. So long has the *Mountaineer* been contaminated and demoralized by this hurtful policy of "protection," benefits for special classes, that it has lost sight of the interests of the majority of the people. This attempt to make the will and interests of the minority the law of the land is plutocracy pure and simple. The *Mountaineer* editor, so far as the tariff is concerned, is a plutocrat.
