GOOD EVENING.

Religious Services.—The services at the Presbyterian church tomorrow will be as follows: Preaching at 11 a. m. by the Rev. E. N. Condit. Sabbath school 12:15 p. m. Junior C. E. meeting at 4 p. m. SPRONKLE ARRESTED.—Last night a dispatch was received from Fresno, Calif., stating that Dr. Spronkle had been arrested here. Sheriff Jackson left on the noon train for Salem to secure a requisition and will leave on the overland for Fresno. The crime committed is one of the worst in the whole category, and if found guilty, the offender should receive the full sentence of the law. The past record of this man seems to be very rocky. According to the Brownsville Times his wife and daughter died very suddenly at Santa Rosa, Calif. Their bodies were exhumed and found full of poison. A lynching party was organized; Spronkle escaped. At Marshfield, the Times says he was again married, and his wife died suddenly. Then he ran away with a young girl. He seems to have been a tramp doctor, only remaining in places a short time. If these things are correct, and they probably are in substance, it is strange that he kept his California name.
