Seizing of Moss.—Traveling men generally declare Albany to be the best city of its size in Western Oregon. We are an old city; but that does not detract from the fact. The following from the Medford Mail is a crazy kind of a boast: Albany, this state, boasts of her old buildings, some of them having had new moss added each winter for over sixty consecutive years. It is different down here in Medford. We don't take kindly to that sort of laurels, and then we couldn't boast if we would—there is no moss on Medford. Instead of crowing over the buildings our grandparents built we give other Oregon localities and pride ourselves upon our new, grand structures of modern architectural design. Our new buildings are all occupied and the tenants have a hustling faculty which permits not the growth of moss. Medford is far from being the habitation of mossbacks.

THE RATE ESTABLISHED.—Special rates on the Southern Pacific to the Midwinter Exposition have been declared. The rate from Albany will be one-half the regular fare with \$2.50 added. This will make it \$27.35 to San Francisco and return, with the privilege of remaining there 10 days, and including five g's coupons, worth \$1 a piece, \$1 being the regular admission to the entire exposition, without any side show admissions. These special tickets will be limited to continuous trip (i. e. without stop-over privileges) both going to and returning from San Francisco. The return passage coupon will be an order for a return limited ticket, and must be presented and surrendered for exchange to the agent at the Midwinter Pacific Company's office, in the Midwinter Fair Grounds.

Council met pursuant to adjournment of Oct. 24, 1893. Mayor absent and Council Burkhardt appointed mayor pro tem. Present—Councilmen Burkhardt, Stewart, Wheeler and Whitney, Attorney, Marshal, Recorder, and Supt. of Streets. Minutes read and approved.

Bills allowed: J. A. McFeron, \$18.75; J. W. Reece, \$10.00; Craner & Bowman, \$1.75; Craner & Hess, \$7.35; Peter Riley, \$3.25; cost bills, \$10.85; N. J. Henton, \$51.30; repairing bridge, \$114.61.

Committee on streets reported repairs to bridge under direction of Mr. Frank Miller, completed in a satisfactory manner, and accepted by the committee. On motion ratified.

Report of Supt. of Streets for October read and referred to committee on streets.

Recorder reported insurance on No. 2 building for \$1236, renewed on the 17th of Oct. Amount of premium \$31.75. On motion action of the Recorder ratified and warrants for the amount of premium ordered drawn.

Committee on accounts reported bill of J. H. Townsend for \$237 for soliciting bridge subscription back to the council without recommendation.

Petition of John Robinson and others for electric light at intersection of 6th and Montgomery street, read, referred to committee on streets.

Councilman Whitney introduced resolution No. 25, relating to sidewalk improvement, which was read and adopted.

Saloon bond of F. L. Reis read and approved, and license granted for 6 months from Nov. 1st, 1893.

On motion J. H. Townsend was allowed \$133.25 on application of soliciting bridge subscription, being allowed upon the subscription upon which payments had been made to the city exclusive of the amount received from F. L. Reis.

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CIRCUIT COURT:

The three cases of A. Hackleman, J. H. Mullen and J. A. Thornton agt the City of Albany were argued this morning and submitted.

This afternoon the trial of John Duncan for assault with a dangerous weapon was in progress before a jury of twelve men.

A true bill was brought in against Jack F. Simpson, the well known O. P. engineer, on the charge of manslaughter, preferred by his first wife. She charges him with giving her medicine several years ago for the purpose of producing an abortion, which she complains was successfully done. At a recent term of court Mr. Simpson obtained a divorce from his wife. At the March term Mrs. Wm. E. Anderson secured a divorce from her husband. Mr. Simpson and Mrs. Anderson were shortly afterwards married. The case was appealed inside of six months a fact which adds to the complication of the matter. At the time of arrest Saturday Mr. Simpson was just ready to start for the Bay. There was not an engineer to be had, so Deputy Sheriff Smith rode with him until the freight train met, when Mr. Simpson took the freight and returned to Albany, arriving at 4 o'clock, while the other engineer proceeded to the Bay. The defendant gave bail at once and was released.
