The land office business in this district, seems to be good regardless of quiet times. During the month of October 47 cash entries were made, including 33 timber claims. There were 43 homestead filings 17 pre-emptions and 23 final proofs made. The cash receipts of the office according to Recorder Paquet's books for the month of October were \$16,818.07, \$13,396.49 of which was made up by fees and testimony accounted for with other receipts and the balance cash paid to the government for land.
