NEW YORK LETTER.
New York, November 11th, 1893.
The people have spoken, and in no un-
certain strain and the consequence is
that the bosses in New from Buffalo to
Brooklyn, have been snowed under an
avalanche of votes. The honor, the
credit and the respectability of the em-
pire state of New York, has been re-
deemed by the great victory achieved for
the people by the election of Edward T
Bartlett to the Court of Appeals bench,
and the defeat of the stained and guilty
Judge Maynard on Tuesday. At the
present writing the New York Herald,
corrected returns, show over 100,000 plu-
rality for Bartlett, and from 25,000 to
30,000 plurality for the rest of the re-
publican state ticket. The entire legis-
lature, both branches, are republican,
giving over thirty majority on joint
ballot. Maynard ran over 30,000 behind
the democratic ticket in this city, and
was only cut in Brooklyn and Buffalo.
All citizens of respectability and honesty
of purpose worked hard as watchers and
workers, in the many polling districts, for
the success of Bartlett. Their efforts
have been crowned with success, and in
fact, in a perfect landslide which com-
pletely buried the Hill-Crocker-Murphy-
Sheehan-Tammany combine and the
thief nominated for a judicial office, as a
reward for this crime against the ballot
and its sacredness. Not alone did May-
nard meet with overwhelming defeat, but
the despised and corrupt combination of
ringsters, in our sister city, Brooklyn,
was smashed to atoms. Chas A Scherren,
republican and independent candidate
defeated the ring's tool, Mayor David A
Boody by over 30,000 plurality, also de-
feated the entire democratic county and
city tickets by plurality ranging from
20,000 to 20,000. William J Gaynor the
eminent democratic lawyer, and defender
of the people's rights in Brooklyn, was
also elected on the republican ticket, for
Supreme Court Judge by over 20,000
plurality. The city of churches rejoices,
and the people are wild with enthusiasm
over the magnificent result. The most
sanguine prediction gave Scherren 15,000,
but to the surprise and gratification of
the hard working and earnest citizens,
who instigated the reform movement
against the present municipal govern-
ment, over 30,000 was the figure. With
the news from Buffalo, which is the home
of "Blue eyed Bill" Sheehan, that the
city gave Bartlett a majority of 10,000
and that the democratic candidates for
the Assembly had been defeated, the
victory for the people in their denuncia-
tion of "boss rule" became complete. It
is to be hoped that the better element in
the democratic party will form a new or-
ganization, and fight hand in hand with
the republicans of this city, to accom-
plish the annihilation of Tammany Hall
next year. The hand writing is plainly
visible on the wall and "Dick" Croker
and his corrupt band of municipal high-
waymen, will surely meet the same fate
of one Isaac H Maynard. Tammany
with its patronage is powerful, and
through officiousness controls many
strong and available vote getting
methods. But Rome fell, and the tiger
will meet his fate when the people of
New York City determine to undermine
the corrupt political corporation, which
it is hoped will be before the flowers
bloom in the spring of 1895.

The drama is at its height, and the
theatres are all prospering, but never-
theless the financial depression which ex-
ists all over the country, shows its effect
upon the box office receipts. The the-
atrical managers however are content
with the present profits. Many new
plays, some successful, others not so
fortunate, have been produced thus far
this season. The most noticeable and
probably the best acted play, was Mr
Richard Mansfield's production of
Shakespeare's comedy "Merchant of
Venice." Shylock was essayed by Mr
Mansfield, it being his first appearance
in the character, which was made famous
by America's late student and actor Ed-
win Booth. Mr Mansfield scored a well
deserved success, and his portrayal of
the despised and revengeful Jew, was artistic,
strong, and contained all the features
which were so well defined by the great
actors of both continents. This new de-
parture, for this young and talented
actor, was unexpected and the dramatists

CITY POLITICS.
Editors Democrat:
I see the city papers are taking a sen-
sible course with reference to the ap-
proaching city election. They suggest
the advisability of nominating repre-
sentative taxpayers, and not representa-
tive curb stone politicians, to represent the
city finances. The sentiment of Albany
this year seems to be to look to its best
financiers to pull it out of embarrass-
ment. A general mixed ticket politically
is being suggested by the heavy tax
payers. I have seen the following names
suggested as well qualified for city offi-
cials: Dr Hill for Mayor, Judge Flinn
for First ward councilman; either Pen-
nington, Geo Simpson, Vance or Grad-
wohl for Second ward, and H Bryant for
Third ward. D Froman and Judge Hew-
itt have been mentioned for mayor, but
it is said both have expressed a desire to
see the combination made in favor of Dr
Hill. It is suggested on the street that
each political party hold its convention
and put these men in nomination accord-
ing to their political faith and the
opposite party in each instance either
indorse or fail to nominate opposing can-
didates. This plan is only suggested for
the law making portion of the ticket.
For the other offices, that of Recorder,
Marshal and Treasurer it is suggested to
abide by the old rule. Let each con-
vention bring out its candidates and let
the contest at the polls be made over
them. The mayor and council get no
pay for their services and at this critical
time in the city finances qualified men
have to be forced into the harness. If
the heat of politics is made the issue
there is danger of getting politicians and
not financiers at the head of affairs. The
shrewdest politician might defeat the
better man for the city. The offices of
Recorder, Marshal and Treasurer are
salaried, and are under instructions from
the council. If they fail to do their duty
the council is looked to for correction.
The city cannot afford to fight over poli-
tics this year.
