THANKSGIVING.—James O'Meara, former Oregon editor, writing in the Eugene Journal on the subject of Thanksgiving says: "Oregon has been a state November for many years. Thanksgiving in five recent years: 1855, 1871, 1876, 1882 and 1893. Under the first state governor, Governor John Whiteaker, there happened on November of five Thursdays, but Governor Whiteaker didn't have much faith in the custom, however. Governor Gillette, Governor Moody, Governor Grover and Governor Woods, respectively, had a five-day Thanksgiving within their several terms of four years, and each of these approved the Thanksgiving on the last Thursday of the month—the 30th. The national Thanksgiving Day has been proclaimed by the President, the unbroken custom has been for the governors of the states to conform to the proclamation of the day fixed by the president and to await his superior proclamation. In this light, Governor O'Meara has simply been a little to the point, he has played his own lone hand."
