

THE MOTIVES OF A POLITICIAN.

Governor Penoyer openly announces himself as a populist. To those who have been intimately associated with the governor since the loss of his grip upon the democratic organization in this state in the democratic state convention in 1892, this move will occasion no surprise. To a few it was known even before that convention assembled that the governor contemplated treason to the party that had made him what he was. It had heaped honor upon him more than upon any other man in the state who had done so little for the party as he. Had the governor been able to dominate the party at its convention in 1892, and forced his own election as a delegate to the national convention, he would have remained loyal and faithful to the party unto this day, notwithstanding the election of Cleveland. In other words, the governor would have been entirely content to remain in the democratic party so long as he could dominate and control its actions. He will now unite himself with the populist party with only one motive—that of his own promotion and personal aggrandizement. He believes that he sees in the distance the doors of the United States senate opening to welcome him as a senator. He believes that the populists will be strong enough to send him, hence his affiliation with that party. But we must caution our populist friends upon this point. If they secure the leaves and fishes they must be reserved for the governor's use. If power in the state or national government is secured it must be understood that such power is to be reserved for the governor. These, with the authority to dominate the party in all its ramifications are the conditions upon which the governor's fidelity to the party is to be made sure and steadfast. There is no doubt about the governor's ability and cunning as a leader. The only question which the populists must settle for themselves is whether they can afford to pay the price to secure the governor's fidelity to their party. At the moment these conditions should be broken the governor would repeat the Benedict Arnold act even if it were in the midst of a heated campaign. The governor is a most pleasant, genial gentleman and we have nothing but the kindest of feelings for him personally but our duty to so large a number of people as the populists of this state impels us to call their attention to the quick sands and quagmires into which they are about to leap. As proof that we are not unduly alarmed for the welfare of our populist friends we cite the fact that quite a number of populist papers, speakers, and scores of populists throughout the state are calling attention to this danger to their party. Forewarned is forearmed. The fact must not be overlooked that feelings of gratitude or good faith cut no figure as rules to govern the governor in his political conduct. He brooks no restraint, not even that of conscience. His purpose is to control others, not to be controlled by others. With him a party organization exists to secure promotion for its leader. Like Quay he thinks there is no place for the ten commandments in politics. We trust this warning to our populist friends will not be without beneficial results.

Silver men propose to renew the silver fight as soon as congress meets. Bland says a sufficient time has elapsed since the repeal of the Sherman law to show it was not responsible for the hard times, and that its repeal, instead of helping matters, has made them worse, by contracting the currency and making it harder for the debtor class to pay. He says he has private assurances from a large number of those who voted for repeal which makes it evident that he can get a majority in the house for free coinage, and he has prepared a bill for early introduction which is a practical revival of the free coinage law of 1837, and makes silver coins of all denominations full legal tender to any amount. It is his purpose not to push the bill at once, but to allow first a reasonable time for the passage of the tariff bill. He thinks there should be a heavy reduction in the tariff and a large income tax imposed.
