TRAIN WRECKING.

Two Men in Jail for Attempting to Wreck an S. P. Train.

For several years trains running on the Southern Pacific have been in jeopardy from obstructions placed maliciously on the track for wrecking purposes. Particularly since the Lake Labish accident three years ago an extra effort has been made to prevent accidents. As already published on Monday another effort was made to wreck an overland train just at the approach of the second trestle this side of the Harrisburg bridge. It was discovered by the engineer of the south-bound local, and the train sufficiently stopped to do no damage, though the rail was struck and knocked from the track. A wreck at the place would have been disastrous. Immediately after the bridge tender approaching on a bicycle noticed two men at the point where the obstruction was placed, and he spoke to them. One of them he claims remarked, "What did the train stop for? Was there an iron rail on the track?" About twenty-five tramps camped near Junction were allowed to ride to Eugene on the overland. When reaching there they were lined up and from them the bridge tender easily picked out the two men, whom the sheriff of Lane county placed under arrest. Sheriff Jackson went to that city yesterday and brought them to Albany on last night's freight. They were taken before Justice L. M. Carl at the Court House at 9:30 o'clock this morning, where they made a preliminary statement. The regular examination will be held tomorrow at 1 o'clock. One is a man about fifty years of age with grizzly hair and short gray beard, a voluble talker; the other is just about half his age and much more innocent in appearance. The former gave his name as David McFayre, the latter as Wm. Darling. They denied any knowledge of the attempted wreck. Their version of the matter is that the train passed the younger one near the north end of the first trestle and the older one at the other end of that trestle while after they had left Harrisburg, that the train stopped ahead of them and then at the bridge. The bridge tender came along, they were examining the rail that had been thrown off, and on being spoken to they referred to the fact that there had probably been an attempt to wreck the train by placing a rail on the track. D. did they do it. Linn county will do its best to find out, for no more serious offense against the public can be committed than that of wrecking a train.

A NAUGHTY SISTER.—Mr. William Wigle, of Crook county, who carries the mail from the Sisters post office to Princeton reported to the Ochoco Review man that he recently saw one of the Three Sisters smoking, that all day long he could see dense volumes of black smoke emitting from the summit of the peak. The other two Sisters did not join in the smoke. Now these Three Sisters may be plainly seen from Albany, and this breach of etiquette was not observed here. The DEMOCRAT is obliged to believe it is as big a fake as Mulcahy's dynamite box. It is almost certain that none of the Sisters smoke, and certainly one of them would not do such a thing without at least offending the others a light. If they intend to smoke right along we advise them to patronize home industry and get their cigars at the Albany factory of Julius Joseph.
