

STILL MISREPRESENTING.

The Oregonian speaking of the democratic plan of tariff reduction says:

There is, indeed, pretense of slight reduction of the ad-valorem duty, but the manufacturer will get more than full compensation through free raw materials; that is, he will have more protection than he is getting now.

It has been the policy of the Oregonian all along to teach its readers that the democrats intended to put all raw material on the free list and to allow existing duties to remain on manufactured products. It has made many of them, who read nothing else, believe this. The Oregonian knows better, but it has one object in view—party advantage. It is the spokesman of moneyed corporations, capitalists and the protected lords of the country. Any measure proposed to equalize taxation so as to place a fair share of the burden upon the rich meets its aggressive opposition. Hence when a proposition is made to impose an income tax so that the rich may be required to bear a fair share of the taxes to support the government that stands ready at all times to protect them and the property, the Oregonian rushes forward and with indignation cries out: "This is an effort to enrich the rich." Under all similar circumstances that paper shows the cloven foot; shows that it represents the rich monopolies and corporations only. On this account it is not to be denominated a newspaper but an organ—an organ of those who always stand ready to crush the poor to promote their own selfish, mercenary aggrandizement. But let us look into the extract above. In 1866 the average duty on wool was placed at about 33 per cent and on woollens at 52 per cent. In 1867 the protectionists raised the duty on wool to 38 per cent and on woollens to 67 per cent. In 1890 the McKinley law raised the duty on wool from 38 to 41 per cent and on woollens to 91 per cent. Thus we see that the republicans have uniformly kept a much larger duty on woolen goods than on wool. They have committed themselves to the policy that woollens are entitled to more protection than wool. Thus in 1866 they fixed this difference at 19 per cent. In 1867 they fixed it at 29 per cent and in 1890 they fixed it at 50 per cent. In all this republican legislation that party was uniformly giving the manufacturers more protection than it did to the wool growers. And in the final consummation and perfection of its scheme of protection it deliberately committed itself to the policy that the woolen manufacturers are entitled to 50 per cent more protection than the wool grower. According to the reports it appears that the ways and means committee of the present house propose to cut off all the specific or compensatory duty on woollens and reduce the ad-valorem duty from 63 to an average of about 35 per cent, thus giving the manufacturer the advantage of only 35 per cent instead of 50 as given by the McKinley law. In other words the democrats propose to reduce the duty on woollens from 91 per cent to 35 per cent, and this the Oregonian calls a slight reduction, reduction of the ad-valorem duty on woollens. Well, we suppose that it has to do this as a duty to its masters, the protected lords of that country.

Some time ago a large tract of swamp lands along the Illinois River, near Peoria, was recovered by a dyke and drainage, and proved to be very fertile, the soil for a considerable depth being a solid mass of decayed vegetable mould. It has been selling at \$100 an acre. The summer has been very dry there and this mould has become as dry as plaster. Some time ago it took fire from burning weeds on one of the farms, and it is said that the whole tract seems likely to burn up. All efforts to extinguish the fire have been in vain. It smoulders and spreads beneath the surface, appearing only in spots, and reducing the soil to the depth of several feet to a bed of ashes. Some two hundred acres have already been burned out, and still the fire continues. Nothing but a tremendous fall of rain can save the land.

The shallowest and most dishonest objection to a tax on large incomes is that it would "revive a war tax."

The republican party has fastened upon the country, for thirty years to come, an enormous expenditure on account of the war. Why should not war taxes meet the war expenditure? With \$160,000,000 to pay on account of pensions—a continuing war debt—and over \$20,000,000 interest on the bonded war debt, what could be more just and fair than to raise part of this enormous sum by a tax on superfluous wealth?

Another strong reason for an income tax is that it will permit a reduction in the really oppressive war taxes—those collected from the necessities of the people.

Fifty per cent of our abominable tariff duties are war taxes. The tariff on wool and woollens, on carpets, clothing, linen, cotton, glass, crockery, and on manufactures generally, has gone up to 50, 75, 100 and even 130 per cent.

When the war ceased the taxes abated more those on wealth. Plutocracy was relieved. Monopoly held on to its protection. The rich shirked their tribute. Incomes were untaxed, manufactures were untaxed, banks were untaxed, stamps were abolished. The whole burden of the support of the government, under constantly increasing expenditures, was left upon consumption.

A tax upon consumption—upon food, fuel, clothing and shelter—is an unequal tax. It requires men to pay, not according to the protection they receive from the government, not upon their ability to pay, not upon their luxuries, but upon their necessities.

It is time to adjust a part of the burdens of taxation with some regard to the ability to bear them. Fifty millions of revenue raised from large incomes will oppress nobody and will relieve nearly everybody.
