

THE NEW TARIFF BILL.

LEATHER AND PAPER.

On sole leather the duty is 5 per cent ad valorem; the present duty is 10 per cent; band or belting leather, 10; no change; leather made into shoe uppers, or vamps, or other forms, 25. The glove schedule is entirely rearranged, and differs from the McKinley law materially.

On printing paper, unsized for books and newspapers, the duty is 12 per cent ad valorem. The present duty is 15 per cent. Surface-coated papers and manufactures thereof, cardboards, lithographic prints except illustrations when forming part of a periodical, newspaper or in printed books, and photographs, autograph and scrap albums, 25 per cent, at present 35; envelopes, 20, at present 25; playing cards, 10 cents per package and 50 per cent ad valorem. The present tariff is 50 cents per package.

FARTHEN AND GLASSWARE.

Some of the specific duties of the McKinley law on earthen and glassware are changed as follows:

On brick, not glazed or ornamented, or decorated in any manner, the duty is 20 per cent ad valorem. The present law makes it \$1.25 per ton; glazed, ornamented or decorated, 30, (present 45); china, porcelain, parian and bisque ware, not decorated, 40, (present 55); china, porcelain, parian, bisque, earthen, stone and crockery ware, and imitations thereof, including plaques, ornaments, toys, canaries, vases, decorated or ornamented, 45 (present 60); plain, green and colored, molded or dressed flint and lime glassware, including bottles, vials, demijohns and carboys, covered or uncovered, whether contents are dutiable or free, not especially provided for in the act, 30. The present duty is from 1 to 1-2 cents per pound.

On all articles of glass, cut, painted, engraved, printed, stained, colored, decorated silvered or gilded, not including plate glass, silvered or looking-glass plates, there is an ad valorem duty of 35 per cent, as against 60 at present; all glass bottles, decanters and other articles of glass, when cut, engraved, painted, colored, printed, stained, etched or otherwise ornamented or decorated, except such as have ground necks and stoppers only, not especially provided for, 35, at present 40; unpainted cylinder, crown and common window glass, not exceeding 16x24 inches square, 1 cent per pound, at present 1 3/4; above that and not exceeding 24x30 inches square, 1 1/2 cent, at present 2-3-8; above that and not exceeding 24x36 inches, 1 3/4, at present 2 3/4; all above that 1-2 cent, at present 3 1/2 cents. Cylinder and crown glass, polished, not exceeding 16x24 inches square, 2-1-2 cents per square foot, at present 4 cents; above that and not exceeding 24x30, 4; at present 6; above that and not exceeding 24x36, 15; at present 25; above that 20, at present 40. Fluted, rolled or rough plate glass, not including crown, cylinder or window glass, not exceeding 16x24 inches square, 3-4 cents per square foot (present 1 cent); above that and not exceeding 24x30 1 cent, at present 1-2 cents; all above that 1 1/2 cents, at present 2 cents. All fluted, rolled or rough plate glass weighing over 100 lbs per square foot shall pay an additional duty on the excess at the same rates herein imposed; provided that all the above plate glass when ground, smoothed or otherwise obscured, shall be subject to the same rate of duty as cast polished plate glass.

On unsilvered spectacles, eyeglasses, opera glasses and other optical instruments and frames for same, 35 per cent ad valorem, as against 60 at present; lenses of glass, or pebbles, wholly or partly manufactured, 35, at present 60; stained or painted window glass and mirrors, not exceeding in size 144 square inches, with or without frames or cases, and all manufactures of glass, or of which glass is a component and chief value, not especially provided for, 35, at present 65.

Marble and stone schedule shows almost a general reduction.

FARM PRODUCTS AND PROVISIONS.

The agricultural schedule includes all farm products and provisions. Many changes are made. The specific duties are changed and the ad valorem duties, as well in many instances. All live animals not placed on the free list by the bill are made liable to a duty of 20 per cent ad valorem, the same as the present law. The duties on other farm products are as follows:

Buckwheat, corn or maize, cornmeal,

oatmeal, rye flour, wheat and wheat flour,

20 per cent; but each of the above products shall be admitted free of duty from any country which imposes no import duty on like products when exported from the United States. Macaroni, vermicelli and all similar provisions take a duty of 25 per cent ad valorem, as against 2 cents per pound at present; anchovies, sardines and other fish packed in oil in tin boxes, or any other form, 30 as against 40.

Fish in cans or packages, made of tin or other material, except anchovies and sardines and fish packed in any other manner not specially enumerated or provided for, have a duty of 25 per cent ad valorem. At present the duty is 30.

On grapes the duty is 25 per cent ad valorem, as against 60 cents per barrel; oranges, lemons and limes, in packages, 10 cents per cubic foot or fractional part; raisins and dried grapes, 1 1/2 cents per pound (at present 2 1/2).

Brandy and other spirits, manufactured or distilled from grain or other materials not specially provided for, has a duty of \$1.50 per gallon, as against \$2.50. Cordials, liquors, absinthe and other spirituous beverages or liquors of all kinds containing spirits and not specially provided for in the act, \$1.50 per proof gallon, as against \$2.50. No lower rate or amount of duties shall be levied, collected and paid on brandy, spirits and other spirituous beverages than is fixed by law for the description of first proof. But it shall be increased in proportion for any greater strength than the strength of the first proof and all imitations of brandy or spirits or wines, imported by any name whatever, shall be placed to the highest duty provided for the articles respectively intended to be represented, and in no case less than \$1 per gallon. The present duty is \$1.50; champagne and other sparkling wines, in bottles containing not more than a quart and more than a pint, 87 per dozen, as against 85 at present. Ale exported and beer in bottles or jugs, 30 cents per gallon. The present rate is 40 cents.

SUNDRIES.

On buttons and button-forms, pearl and shell buttons, wholly or partly manufactured, the duty is 40 per cent ad valorem; the present law provides 2 1/2 cents per line and 25 per cent ad valorem; ivory, vegetable, ivory bone, or horn buttons, 25, as against 50 at present.

On explosive substances, matches, friction or lucifer, the duty is 20 per cent ad valorem, as against 10 per cent gross at present; percussion caps, 30, as against 40.

On jewelry and precious stones, and all articles not specially provided for in this act, and commercially known as "jewelry," and cameos in frames, there is a duty of 25 per cent ad valorem, a reduction from 50 per cent; precious stones of all kinds, cut but not set, 15, as against 10 per cent.

Pipes and all smokers' articles not specially provided for, 50 per cent as against 70.

Umbrellas, parasols and sun-shades, covered with material composed wholly or in part of silk, wool or goat hair, carry 45 per cent ad valorem. The present tariff is 55 per cent.

Many articles of chemicals, oils and paints, the schedules are transferred to the free list.

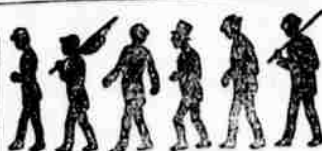
