

IT IS COMING.—Receiver Beall, of the Lincoln County Bank has received instructions from Washington authorizing a dividend to depositors. A schedule is being prepared, which will be sent to the comptroller probably tomorrow. On his receipt checks will be made and returned to Albany and distributed among depositors. So far the first dividend will be paid in about three weeks. There is some question in seeing it in sight; but it should have been paid several weeks ago. How much of a dividend will be paid is not known. The actual receipts justify at least 25 per cent.

AFTER ZEPH JON.—J. W. Parrish, deputy sheriff of Lincoln County, was in Salem today. He is after Zeph Jon, the banker, who with his brother, B. R. Jon, and M. M. Davis, was indicted by the grand jury for larceny of public money, in soliciting the deposit of the county funds of Lincoln County and then refusing to account for them on demand of the county treasurer. One of Sheriff Knight's deputies has gone to Jefferson, near which place Zeph Jon is located, to secure him—Salem Independent.

REARDED FUGITIVE.—The Oregon Pacific steamer Wm M. Hoag arrived this afternoon about 3 o'clock with 30 or 40 tons of freight. They came from Harrisburg since 8 o'clock this morning but were delayed some at the draw bridge and also by the ferry cable below this city. Arriving at the bridge some delay was experienced in landing owing to the high water. The freight will be unloaded tonight. The same officers are in command as when the boat was here before.

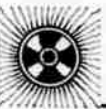

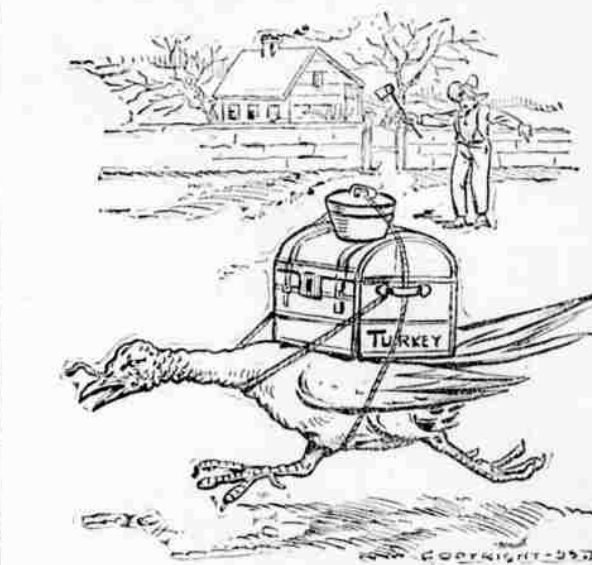
