THE WORDS OF DEMAGOGUES.

Representatives Hermann, Ellis and Doolittle say that the Wilson tariff bill will cripple the industries of the Pacific states; that there are no states in the Union, in proportion to their population, that will suffer as much as Oregon and Washington by placing wool, hops, coal and also lumber on the free list. These industries have grown so as to put these states in the front rank of producing states, and to enact a tariff law putting these products into the market unprotected would paralyze the productive energies of the great Northwest.—The Dallas Chronicle.

Just a few facts will show how full of demagogism the above is. First, it is a well admitted fact (admitted by protectionists as well as by tariff reformers), that no protection can be given (or is needed, in fact), to an article produced in this country and exported to foreign countries and sold in competition with such article produced in the foreign country. This being a safe premise we submit the following facts:

The amount of bituminous coal (that kind upon which there is a duty,) imported into this country for the month of July, 1891, was 12,024 tons. The amount exported during the same month was 122,012 tons. Excess of exports over imports 99,988 tons. For the seven months ending July 31st, 1891, the imports of coal were 716,441 tons and the amount of exports was 910,478 tons. Excess of exports over imports, 194,037 tons. For the twelve months ending Dec 31st, 1891, the amount imported was 1,303,318 tons. The amount exported was 1,645,866 tons. Excess of exports over imports 342,548 tons. The amount imported during the twelve months ending Dec 31st, 1892, was 1,143,304 tons and the amount exported was 1,645,686 tons. Excess of exports over imports, 502,382 tons. From this it will be seen that we are selling coal abroad in larger quantities than is being sold of the foreign product here, and hence this cry of ruining the coal industry by putting coal on the free list is the sheerest demagogism. In the case of hops a stronger case is made. Amount of hops imported during the 12 months ending December 31st, 1891, was 2,707,876 bales. Amount exported during the same period 11,048,528 bales. Excess of exports over imports 8,340,652 bales. Again: Amount of imports during the 12 months ending December 31st, 1892 was 2,573,946 bales. Amount exported during the same period, 9,181,495 bales. Excess of exports over imports, 6,607,549 bales.

As to the matter of lumber: The total value of all manufactured woods, including boards, planks, deals, shingles, cabinet ware, etc., imported during the year ending December 31st, 1891, was \$14,438,593. The value of the exports of said articles for the same period was \$24,660,283. Excess of exports over imports was \$10,221,750. The number of thousand feet of lumber alone exported during the above period was 322,672 M feet. The export for the same period was 771,147 M feet. Excess of exports over imports 448,475 M feet.

From the above facts it will appear that the coal, hop and lumber industries will not be ruined by any means by the Wilson bill. These promoters of protected interests seem to forget that there is anybody whose rights are to be considered except the protected interests. If people can make get their clothing, coal and lumber a little cheaper under the Wilson bill than under the McKinley bill it will simply be securing the greatest good to the greatest number, and this is a very safe rule for fair dealing men to be governed by.

The latest scheme for dividing Ireland need not be objected to by the Irish people. It is a proposal to create a ship canal from Dublin to Galway Bay. The result would be shortening the passage across the Atlantic by nearly a day, making Dublin a first-class seaport and greatly increasing the prosperity of the territory through which the canal passes. The project originated with the late Marquis of Anglesey, and its present sponsor is Sir Edward Martin an English railway magnate and a close friend of Mr. Gladstone. The canal is estimated to cost \$40,000,000, which is about the sum that Manchester has paid for a 40 mile canal connecting that great manufacturing city with the ocean.

One of the best and most respected citizens of Douglas county recently talked tariff with a Roseburg Review representative. "I have made all I have in wool growing," said he, "and I'm for free trade in wool. The higher they have made tariff, the lower the price has gone, and I believe it would be higher if it were on the free list. If I am mistaken and it falls still lower, I am willing to quit the business and try something else. I believe in protecting everybody or nobody, and as no means has yet been found to protect the sheep grower by tariff legislation, I am willing to stand on an equal footing with him. The farmers are the backbone of the country and our protective policy has ruined their market, and taxed them on nearly every necessity of life until many of them are on the verge of bankruptcy. When the farmer is impoverished every branch of business and every industry feels the effect of it, and that is what is the matter with country now."

It is not remembered that any of the manufacturers who threaten to reduce wages if the McKinley law is repealed increased them when that law was enacted, even though it increased their measure of "protection" very greatly. A case in point is that of a particularly valuable individual, one Dodge of Delongville, N. Y., who makes felt. Mr. Dodge asserts that if the Wilson bill is enacted he will move his works to some foreign country. But when the McKinley law increased the duty on goods of the sort he manufactures from 35 per cent to 102 per cent Mr. Dodge slapped his pocket and grinned. "There was no talk about increasing the wages of labor here from that moment."

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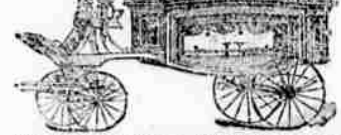
