TWO ALBANY MEN.

The Oregon Knight gives the following sketches of two Albany men:

Dr J. L. Hill Grand Vice Chancellor, was born in Tennessee in 1845; learned the printers trade in Albany and Salem, and studied medicine in 1865 and following years graduated in the medical department of the Willamette University, since which time he has been steadily practicing the healing art; graduated in a commercial college receiving the degree of M. A., and received the degree of B. S. from McMinnville college and the degree C. L. S. C. from Chattanooga, New York; has been president of various medical societies, and has held several civil offices of importance.

Dr Hill's requirements are uncommon and have enabled him to take a very high stand in his profession. He has written upon various scientific topics in a way to command thoughtful attention, and some of his productions have done much to extend the bounds of science. His exploration of certain artificial mounds in Linn county have been of great interest to scientists and others. The doctor is one of an unusually talented family, and well maintains its distinction. He is a son of the (late) Rev R. C. Hill, M. D., L. L. D., who was for years prominent as a physician and a divine, and a brother of the Hon W. L. Hill, the compiler of the Oregon and subsequently the Washington Codes. Dr Hill has been mayor of the city of Albany and has been a member of the city council a number of times. He is the fortunate owner of one of the finest libraries, both professional and miscellaneous, to be found in the state, and being still a great student, makes of it constant and profitable use. The doctor was a lecturer on Physiology in the Albany College Institute and enjoys a large and lucrative practice, and the confidence and esteem of all who have the pleasure of his acquaintance. He is the present Surgeon General of the Oregon State Militia. Bro. Hill was a charter member of Laurel Lodge No. 7, K. of P., to which he still belongs, is a member of Columbia Division, U. R., and is the present surgeon of First Regiment U. R. K. P. Oregon with rank of captain. He has just passed the chair of Grand Prelate and was unanimously elected Grand Vice Chancellor at the last session.

Lieut. Col. Geo. W. Hochstetler, supreme representative was born in Holmes county, Ohio, Nov. 11, 1849, removed with his parents to Illinois in early childhood. Declining to "go west," he arrived in Albany, Or., March 1874, where he is still located, being identified with a large manufacturing interest of which he has the management. He took a leading part in the organization of Laurel Lodge No. 7, K. of P., receiving the Ranks of the order at its institution May 30th, 1879, serving as Chancellor Commander to Dec 31st; was also one of the first Representatives to the Grand Lodge at its institution in 1881 and has been in attendance at every session since; was elected G. P. in 1882, G. V. C. in 1883, G. C. in 1884 and S. R. in 1891, receiving the unanimous vote of the G. L. each time. He is also an enthusiastic member of the U. R. and holds a commission as Lieut. Col of the 1st Regt O. U. R. K. P.

TIED UP EAST.

Sunday mornings Examiner says: The Oregon Pacific Company's long looked for steamer Willamette Valley arrived late this afternoon and was plastered with attachments almost before she was fast to the dock. The heaviest claim is that of W. A. Swinerton, amounting to \$23,200, mainly for supplies the steamer took on at this port. There were several other claims filed, so many, in fact, that the two deputy marshals who have been camped on the dock for the past forty-eight hours had their breast pockets dislodged with papers. The company sold at auction on the 15th and the question of liability outside of the receivers' holdings is likely to take the matter into the courts. Swinerton, anticipating this, also filed a garnishment on any money that the vessel's late owners may have on deposit in the Anglo-Californian Bank.

The outlook for being paid, at a discount of 80 per cent, is surely not very encouraging.
