GOOD EVENING

LEGAL FEES.—Fay & Gest, the O.P. lawyers have sued Jas A. Blair et al for \$700 as remuneration for legal services rendered in June 1892 today. This is a sample of work not often witnessed. Albany is full of more competent lawyers who would do a work for a tenth of the sum. Some of them are humorous.

TO SERVICES.—Fay & Gest, obtaining approval of E. E. Hogg as receiver, \$1000, pending in removal of Hogg and obtaining a writ of habeas corpus for \$2500. Another \$1000 for obtaining a continuance of a writ of the road from March 1 to March 7. Amount claimed is \$2500. Another \$1000 is demanded for securing a second appointment of the sale to March 14, and a third continuance till June 25 a sum of \$1000 is charged. John P. Fay's services in removing C. H. Gest, F. K. Pennington and P. Fay as attorneys for receiver are valued at \$2000, with \$150 extra for expenses, and the price of his work in removing claims of Wallis Nash and William Hogg for large salaries and taking of money before Referee Hufferd in regard to the sale is valued at \$1750. The services of Fay & Gest in attending to alteration of the terms of sale in abandoning the "upper floor" and offering the property to the highest bidder for cash are listed at \$1000, with an additional item of \$35.

ABOUT A FOOT BALL GAME.—Several days ago the DEMOCRAT gave its opinion in the great foot ball game to take place in Portland on next Monday the Multnomahs will not score. Today the DEMOCRAT received the following dispatch from Portland:

ALBANY DEMOCRAT: How much money do you bet we don't score.

WILL-TO-DEATH.—The DEMOCRAT never bets; but the Man at Town has watched pretty closely the year or two the foot ball history of the game. He believes Multnomahs will score because of a lack of training to do so well a trained team as Stanford, if not enough. Foot ball is a science, and Stanford has some of it; but Stanford could not score against Princeton, Yale, Harvard, Pennsylvania. Second, athletic teams inferior to college teams; third, the Multnomahs, coached by Heflinger, who also played, could not score against Stanford does team work, Multnomahs not enough of it. Foot ball is a science and there are sometimes some who bet the Man about Town will score for the fact and again Multnomahs do not score.

THE OTHER SIDE.—At a meeting of some working men in Salem Governor Penney's letter to Cleveland was endorsed and the resolutions against it condemned. The following live resolutions were also passed:

That it is the deliberate judgment of this meeting that taxes, national, state, county and city, are unjustly and exorbitantly high and that a total yearly tax of 4 per cent in Salem is especially extravagant, unjustifiable and destructive of the industrial and commercial interests of the city. That a city council should at once begin the process of retrenchment and reform, not by charging some laborer who supports his family on \$40 to \$50 per month, but by reducing the salaries of city officials, and the marshal's salary of \$1,500 should be reduced to \$1,000, and that the monthly salary of policemen of \$75 to \$50 without duty to the force, and all fees and commissions should be turned into the city treasury.
