

THE MARKETS

The Red Crown Mills report from Portland received today shows the following: The local market is barely steady with prices rather against sellers, excepting when there is a lot of choice shipping offered in which case something over and above normal quotations are obtainable. There is much wheat offering from the eastern section which will not grade up to average shipping wheat and for this quality little or no demand exists. For Walla Walla best prices we hear of are 82 1/2 c. 83 1/4 and for valley about 92 1/2. Exporters appear to have wheat well in hand and no talk as if there was any immediate improvement in prospect.

Eastern markets ruled weak and went down under comparatively large receipts and small shipments. The increase in the visible supply, although small in comparison with previous seasons, yet had the effect of discouraging buyers.

Europe is doing but little buying at present and the position of trade abroad may be called "of a waiting character." She visible supply of wheat is 80,250,000 bushels; on Jan 3, 1893, it was 81,294,000; Jan 4, 1892, 45,669,000; Jan 5, 1891, 25,847,000.

FATAL ACCIDENT

While hunting birds on the farm of N H Looney, near Jefferson, W J Dyer was accidentally killed Monday evening. In company with one of Mr Looney's little sons he went hunting, but the boy became tired and went home. Mr Dyer not returning in time, a search was instituted and his body found near a fence. One barrel of the gun was cocked and it is supposed that in climbing the fence with the gun at full cock it slipped and one barrel was discharged, the lead striking the unfortunate man in the back of the head, near the base of the brain and lodging in the skull of the forehead.

Mr Dyer was a son-in-law of S A Clarke, of Salem, having married Sarah Clarke, a few years ago. He was also a brother-in-law of Mrs N H Looney.
