The College Y M C A conference of Oregon is holding its third annual session in this city with the Albany College Y M C A. The young men with the help of the young ladies of the College Y M C A, made complete arrangements for the entertainment of their guests before the holidays so that when the delegates arrived there was nothing to do but to show them to their places of entertainment.

By three o'clock, yesterday afternoon, the young men were assembled in the chapel and many of them had already formed numerous acquaintances among the delegates of other colleges. Several persons were heard to say that they had met so many that they did not know whom they had met or whom they had not.

A very interesting devotional service followed by an introduction service occupied the time from 3 o'clock to 5 o'clock.

A song service led by the Apollo club was of a nature to fit one for the excellent intellectual request that followed, in the evening.

E W Linnell, president of the Albany College Y M C A and President E N Condit delivered addresses of welcome of an entertaining character, warm with a hearty welcome, to the fine looking gathering of young men present.

They were responded to by President P L Campbell, of the Monmouth State Normal school who brought out in well rounded sentences the fellow feeling of students whenever and wherever they meet, and as well the wonderful binding force of Christ that unites young and old as brothers in all places and thus felt assured of the welcome extended.

The Guitarr Quartet was heard in a popular selection that pleased so much a second was demanded.

Rev I D Driver delivered the address of the evening, on the subject of "Myrracles, their relationship to Nature and Science."

He started out with the proposition that ignorance is the basis of all progress. He told of his offer of \$1000 to Col Ingersoll for a single instance of progress outside of the discussion of Christianity. He could not do it. Referred to China, Africa, etc.

Advancing his thoughts, he came down to the subject of myrracles, and on the subject of evidence referred to the fact that February, 1896 did not have a full moon, something that will not occur again in over a million years. In nature there must be one compensation, gravity; in the moral universe there is only one commandment, obey the law; the ten commandments are simply ten precepts, there is one shall and nine prohibitions. As an illustration of the controlling of nature the speaker referred to the flying of a bird in an ingenious manner. So myrracles are not supernatural, they are nature controlled. The eye does not see nor the ears hear. It is the mind. So you will only see God with the mind. Speaking of the Bible he showed how there had never yet been a correct translation. The address was a continual mass of argument and illustration, eloquent and convincing.

This morning the work of the conference began in earnest, with written reports from the various associations which showed that the last year has been one of advance and profit.

Lessons from the blackboard was the heading under which the statistics of the Y M C A work in Oregon was discussed. Several students from the various schools took part. Between 11 o'clock and noon Bible study was discussed. It was felt that more prayerful study of the Word of God was needed as well as more reading.
