GOOD EVENING

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS:

Tuesday evening, Jan 9.

Present—Mayor, Recorder, Marshal, Street Superintendent and councilmen Whitney, Pfeiffer, Walters, Schell, Burkhardt and Marshall.

The old rules were adopted for 1894.

The ways and means committee reported important matters under consideration, and moved an adjournment when made until Tuesday night, Jan 16.

A. I. Lamb, Chief Engineer, reported the property in good condition except 500 feet of hose which is in bad condition. The report shows the expenditures of the companies to have been during 1893: No 1's, \$837.04, including uniforms; No 2's, \$576.71, including uniforms, H & L Co, \$106.39, and chemical engineer; No 3's, \$12.10.

A petition of Pfeiffer et al asked for the appointment of Charles Burns as night-watch and engineer for No 1's.

The report of the tax collector showed, \$59.71 collected of the tax of '91; \$712.59, of tax of '92; \$10,855.00 of tax of 1893. Delinquent tax of 1893, \$3231.

Applications for position of engineer of No 1's and nightwatchman, Charles Burns; U G Hale, with recommendation of No 1's; E F Hyland.

For position of nightwatch, W A McClain.

For engineer of No 2's and nightwatchman, John Jones.

For superintendent of streets, Benj Johnson. A B Morris, G W Burkhardt.

On motion all were laid on table until next meeting of the council.

Win Vance, by his attorney C E Wolverton, applied for permission to repair his wooden building on Second street by building it out to the street, and putting a glass front therein. On motion granted unanimously.

Complaint was made of a house in the Third ward frequented by several young men, which has become a nuisance in the neighborhood. It was suggested that a formal complaint be made.

Petition of G W Maston, asked for privilege of moving frame building on Second street to line of street and placing glass front therein granted.

A SAN JOSE LETTER.—A former Albany man writing from San Jose to a friend here, among other things, says: We have had for two weeks rain in the valleys, and snow in the hills and mountains. It froze a water pipe solid last night. The roads are perfect mud holes, frozen solid. The most disagreeable weather here every night. The weather is of a damp, salty cold; people from the east say they suffer more from the cold than back there. A boy froze his ears while working on a street car. Tell my friends to keep away from the Midwinter fair. It was got up for a take in. There are people robbed in day light in sight of the police; women and men calling for help. About all the roughest class of foot pads and cut throats will be there. All that come are liable to be robbed. The money will all be left in California. They will get it from the foot pads if they have to arrest them to get it. I have been here long enough to learn some things.
