

HARVEY'S HOWL.

They boast themselves of property and money to the amount of \$600,000,000 or more. Just think of its howling about injustice because they are taxed 1-10 of the value of their property. The Oregonian is up in arms about it. Oh! what a spectacle.

They got the law they wanted, when they held a full hand, and a lob-tailed flush, and now they are the first to kick. The Multnomah delegation were sold for a bill that was before the last legislature to exempt notes from taxation, thereby allowing the money lenders to go Scott free, so far as paying taxes were concerned, and yet the Oregonian says they want equal and just taxation. Oh! consistency thou art a jewel. My God what a state of affairs.

The Multnomah delegation threatened to secede if the legislature passed a bill creating precinct assessors, and yet the Oregonian says they want fair assessments. There was a bill before the last legislature to do away with the state board of equalization. I am reliably informed that the Multnomah delegation were opposed to its passage. Same as they were to all other bills that tended to reduce offices and expenses thereby decreasing our taxes.

They championed the Militia bill, and secured its passage; the most infamous bill that ever passed the Oregon legislature. \$100,000 to go for a dress parade.

The Oregonian says their land is assessed at \$53 per acre when they ask from \$500 to \$800 per acre for it. I will leave it to any fair minded man if \$10 per acre throughout Linn Co is not higher than \$53 in Multnomah Co.

The Oregonian even says they will refuse to pay their taxes, yet they desire to be called the metropolis of the north west but kick about paying taxes on \$61,000,000.

WEAVER TOUCHED UP

In the New York World is a long account of a divorce suit at Des Moines, Iowa, the parties being Mr Gillette & Mrs Gillette. Mr Gillette was a former congressman from Iowa and was at one time associated with Gen James B Weaver in the publication of the Tribune, a greenback paper. The following is an extract from the World's account of the trial:

The most interesting feature of the trial was the dragging of Gen James B Weaver into it. "Why did you do this?" asked the opposing counsel.

"Because Gen Weaver acted like a gentleman when Chester Turner was there, and when he was not there the General did not act like a gentleman."

"Did Gen Weaver ever object to Chester Turner being in the room?"

"Yes, he did. He said that he did not want Chester Turner in the room when he came there. Once he said that he would kill Chester if he came into the room again when he was there."

Mrs Gillette charges that Gillette and Gen Weaver have conspired to rob her of her property.
