

GRANT'S PASS, Ore., Jan. 11.—A fire at Grant's Pass in block 49, lots No. 5 to 11 inclusive, burned Hansen Bros. store, loss \$2500, insurance, \$500. The Wright saloon, no insurance. RECEIVER CLARK HOME.—Receiver Charles Clark returned this morning from San Francisco, where he had been to make arrangements to get the Willamette Valley out of the clutches of the law. As \$80,000 in bonds were required this was not done. Arrangements were made through for a boat to carry the freight at a charterage of \$40 a day. If this can be paid the boat will be kept running. A boat is a necessity and it is probable a contract will be completed by means of which ocean communication will be kept up with San Francisco. The Steamer Del Norte will leave San Francisco for Yaquina city next Tuesday with freight and passengers coming in place of the Willamette valley.

DEATH OF MRS. HANSHAW.—The Democrat has just received a dispatch from Portland announcing the death there of Mrs. John Hanshaw, nee Myra Mansfield today, from the effects of child birth. Mrs. J. H. Upham of this city was present at the time among others. The deceased was a resident of Albany for a good many years, until a few years ago, and was greatly beloved by all who knew her. She is a niece of Mrs. Jonas Davis of Sheld.

THE CIGARETTE LAW.—It shall be unlawful to sell, barter, trade, give or in any manner furnish to any minor under age of eighteen years any tobacco, cigars or cigarettes in any form, or any compound in which tobacco forms a component part, without the written consent or order of such minor's parent or guardian; and when such minor has no parent or guardian, then in that case consent may be given by the county court in the county in which said minor resides. Any person violating the provisions of this act, upon conviction, is subject to a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50. It is also unlawful for any minor under the age of 18 years to smoke or in any way use any cigar, cigarette or tobacco in any form whatsoever in any public highway, street, place, square or resort, and any minor violating this provision is subject to a fine of from one to ten dollars or imprisonment of two days for each offense.

ROASTED THE PREACHERS.—The Eugene Register says: Rev. J. H. Weber, well known in this city, gave the Boston clergy a talking up on New Years day. He upbraided them for what he considered a lack of divinity. "Ministers are afraid to preach about hell and damnation," he continued. The Eugene Guard says: "The city council has passed an ordinance licensing non-resident laundrymen who do business in this city. A license of \$20 per quarter is to be charged, or \$80 per year. This will probably confine that class of work to resident laundrymen."

Wiele, of Prineville, \$840. As the price is less in nearly every case, than the route can be operated there is liable to be some flickering.

The decision at Washington making a would-be purchaser of "green goods" liable under the law, promises to result sensationally. Inquiry at the office of Inspector J. H. Johnson developed the fact that 1800 names in possession of the officer included a great number of prominent men. Leading physicians, lawyers, prominent professional and business men all over the United States, and particularly Illinois, Missouri, Arkansas and Wyoming, are known to be included. It is also stated letters applying for bogus money, written by at least one ex-congressman, a candidate for governor and many federal and civil officers, are in the hands of the authorities. It seems to be dangerous business to write even for fun, as has been done in Albany.
