A POPULIST SEEKING LIGHT.

A subscriber to the DEMOCRAT, calling himself a "populist," asks us to publish the tariff plank of the people's party platform adopted at Omaha. He says "a democrat" claims there is no tariff plank in the Omaha platform and he contends there is. Our populist friend is in error. There is no tariff plank in the people's party platform and so far as platforms go the views of the people's party on the tariff is not known. Most of their leaders ignore it and say it is not an issue. A few of their leaders are tariff reformers, notably, Jerry Simpson. Our populist friend asks another very pertinent question. It is this: "Is it true as the Oregonian and many other republicans allege that while the Wilson bill puts wool on the free list it makes no material reduction in manufactures of wool?" For the hundredth time the DEMOCRAT finds it necessary to denounce the statement as false. If "Populist" will read the following paragraphs he will see how utterly false is this statement of the Oregonian. Let us examine into the reduction in duty on wools as made by the Wilson bill and see how much truth there is in the above statement. Under the McKinley law the duty on woolen and worsted yarns, valued at not more than 30 cents per pound, is 27.66 per cent and under the Wilson bill it is 30 per cent. Valued at more than 30 and not more than 40 cents per pound the duty under the McKinley law is 27.79 per cent and under the Wilson bill it is 30 per cent. Valued at not more than 40 cents per pound the duty under the McKinley law is 27.92 per cent and under the Wilson bill it is 30 per cent. Valued at more than 40 and not more than 50 cents per pound the duty under the McKinley law is 28.05 per cent and under the Wilson bill it is 30 per cent. Valued at more than 50 and not more than 60 cents per pound the duty under the McKinley law is 28.18 per cent and under the Wilson bill it is 30 per cent. Valued at more than 60 and not more than 70 cents per pound the duty under the McKinley law is 28.31 per cent and under the Wilson bill it is 30 per cent. Valued at more than 70 and not more than 80 cents per pound the duty under the McKinley law is 28.44 per cent and under the Wilson bill it is 30 per cent. Valued at more than 80 and not more than 90 cents per pound the duty under the McKinley law is 28.57 per cent and under the Wilson bill it is 30 per cent. Valued at more than 90 and not more than 100 cents per pound the duty under the McKinley law is 28.70 per cent and under the Wilson bill it is 30 per cent. The reduction on blankets valued at not more than 30 cents per pound is from 28.22 per cent to 25 per cent. Valued at more than 30 and not more than 40 cents per pound the reduction is from 28.35 per cent to 25 per cent. Valued at more than 40 and not more than 50 cents per pound the reduction is from 28.48 per cent to 25 per cent. Valued at more than 50 and not more than 60 cents per pound the reduction is from 28.61 per cent to 25 per cent. Valued at more than 60 and not more than 70 cents per pound the reduction is from 28.74 per cent to 25 per cent. Valued at more than 70 and not more than 80 cents per pound the reduction is from 28.87 per cent to 25 per cent. Valued at more than 80 and not more than 90 cents per pound the reduction is from 29.00 per cent to 25 per cent. Valued at more than 90 and not more than 100 cents per pound the reduction is from 29.13 per cent to 25 per cent. The same general is made in the duty on women's and children's dress goods, felts, plushes and other fine fabrics, cloaks, dolmans, webbing, carpets etc. Can anyone after reading the above facts say that the Wilson bill does not make a very material reduction in the duties on wools? Let us now reduce these comparative duties to simpler forms. Under the McKinley law on every \$100 worth of woolen and worsted yarns imported valued at not more than 30 cents per pound a duty of \$27.66 must be paid. Under the Wilson bill the duty will be \$30 on the \$100. Under the McKinley law the duty on \$100 worth of woolen or worsted goods the duty is \$27.54. Under the Wilson bill it will be \$30. "Populist" from this can see that the Oregonian is continually attempting to deceive him. In fact deception seems to be one of the necessary means resorted to to make people contented with the scheme of protectionism. These statements here are made up of

the Wilson bill itself and the per centages under the McKinley law are made from the records of the treasury department.

The Salem Journal says that the executive committee of the Republican National committee did what is considered a fine stroke of policy, by passing resolutions, first, for admission of Utah to the Union; second, for admission of all territories.

Yes, we remember once of a criminal going before the court and pleading guilty in order to secure as light a sentence as possible. Now, these republicans, seeing they can no longer keep Utah, New Mexico and Arizona out of the Union come up when their help is not needed and decided to favor the admission of the territories. There is no credit in this course.

The ways and means committee of the house has decided, by a vote of 6 to 5, to reconsider their former action in favor of an income tax, and by the same vote to refer matters to the democratic caucus of the house. This is a step in the wrong direction. An income tax will have to be adopted, or some other means of raising revenue, or otherwise the Wilson bill materially amended.
