A GREAT SCHEME.—Lawyer Bingham, of Salem, was in town the other day and as a result of his visit there was a well authenticated rumor in the air that a new legal move is to be made by which it is hoped to raise some money for the creditors of the Oregon Pacific. It is an axiom of law that the plaintiff in all suits shall pay the costs. The Farmer's Loan and Trust company, a rich New York bank, is the plaintiff in the big suit which threw the O. P. in the hands of the court, as a result of which an indebtedness of a million and a quarter of dollars has been piled up and Lawyer Bingham holds that this is court costs and that the plaintiff should be required to pay them. He is acting for a number of the local creditors, and it is said will file the papers with Judge Fullerton the early part of next week.—Times.

ANTHONY SIMPSON DEAD.—Yesterday's Corvallis Times says: Rev Anthony Simpson, father of John and Mary Simpson, Mrs Woodcock and George Simpson, of Portland, is dead. A telegram received shortly before noon today announced that his death occurred this morning at Philadelphia. He was 62 years of age, and his malady was Bright's disease. Deceased arrived at Albany, Oregon, in 1865, after a few months went to Olympia, to reside. Eighteen months later he came to Corvallis as pastor of the Presbyterian church. Afterward he settled on his farm five miles north of town, and there remained until about ten years ago, when he went to San Francisco, and from there after five years to Philadelphia where he resided until death.

The receipts are placed at, taxes, \$21,000; licenses and fines, \$30,300.

THE KINDERGARTEN

A meeting of the directors of the Albany Kindergarten Association was held at the residence of Dr G W Mason last evening. Among other things done the secretary was instructed to send for the Kindergarten News, the Education of Man and "Reminiscences of Froebel," for the use of the association.

The following on the history of the kindergarten work in Albany was read:

Among the educational and religious movements that have interested the people of Albany, from time to time, the history of the kindergarten work among us deserves more than a passing notice. Slowly but surely the real thought has grown until today there is more intelligent interest and a better understanding of the general principles underlying Froebel's system of education than ever before. In proof of this assertion one needs but to be reminded of the association recently formed which enrolls in its thirty-five members some of the noblest and ablest minds of Albany. This fact alone is full of meaning and promise, for when an organization sets itself to work systematically to study the principles and methods of a work like that of the kindergarten the outcome is sure to be new life and power to the work under consideration, thus laying the foundation for a permanent institution. It is easy to prophesy from present indications that the day is not far distant when the kindergarten proper, shall have become the heritage of every child in our city, and its beautiful spirit pervade every Sunday school, day school, and many of our homes.

The first seed which has produced this school, was sown by Mrs W Mead about five years ago, who opened a primary school in the W C T U hall and used primary methods whenever possible. There are boys and girls in their teens who will not soon forget their kind and faithful teacher, Mrs Mead. After about a year's duration this school, passed into the hands of two highly esteemed young ladies, Mrs Newberry nee Wheeler and Miss Helen Crawford, in whose mind it was to continue the kindergarten effort.

The seed thus sown was stimulated to larger growth by the coming of Mrs Emma Tatham from the free kindergarten of Saginaw, Mich. It was not long before it was discerned that the obstacle in the way of the more rapid development of this work was the general indifference to the school caused by the lack of understanding of real value of this system in the formation of the child's character. A kindergarten was opened on Seventh St, and for over two years this little school has served as a silent missionary to uphold the true kindergarten ideal. But the spirit of this school has reached beyond the little class of 20 pupils, and interested a number of families, until by common consent aided by the untiring efforts of the president, Mrs W H Lee, a kindergarten association was formed. It is evident that the kindergarten has come to stay in Albany, to become an uplifting power in the community. The kindergarten has been suspended for a short time on account of sickness, but will be resumed as soon as a suitable home can be found. Is there not some generous citizen, who has a building or room, centrally located that he could put at the disposal of the association and thus aid a worthy cause and make happy many little ones. But no narrative of the kindergarten would be complete without a word of praise to the editors of the local papers who have been a unit in aiding and strengthening the work by generously publishing anything that might help it, often making favorable editorial comments. For this and the courteous interest shown by many of the citizens of Albany, the association is deeply grateful.
