DISTRESS UP THE SANTIAM.—The Salem Journal says: There is undoubtedly liable to be a great deal of suffering among the settlers along the Santiam river near Mill City. W. H. Udy, who has settled a small ranch a mile and a half from there, has been in the city two days looking for work but without success. He came to the Journal office last night and stated his case. He left his family there in a cabin, a wife and three little children. They had 25 lbs of flour left. That was all. Many families are living on vegetables straight, having neither flour nor meat. He offered to work for 50 cts a day. In the hope to send them some money to eat food. Who are the people on the Santiam liable to become destitute? Ranchers, settlers who live in rented places, miners, newcomers, loggers, homesteaders, hunters, people formerly employed in the sawmills and lumber camps there, now idle. They have no cattle or supplies, nothing to sell, nothing to earn and "no help from nowhere in sight." Supplies will have to come from somewhere. Some one responsible up there should be prepared to receive and distribute necessities of life. Thousands of dollars of unpaid labor due from the railroad company is also a great source of destitution. The poor people had counted upon this and the greatest hardship results from the failure of the company. There should be immediate relief for these people or there will be great suffering. The Journal has given Mr. Udy a few days' work so he can send his family relief. He has a bottle of gold dust to sell and says if the river was not so high he could make small wages washing gold.

AN ATROCIOUS CRIME.—An Albany man shows the DEMOCRAT a copy of the Coast Review with an account of a most atrocious crime in order to secure insurance money, one that makes one's blood curdle. According to a confession of a young man, Charles Mason, of Hammond of Fremont county, Idaho, on Nov 25 last, poured coal oil over several horses Mason drove into the barn as well as on the floor of the barn and adjoining house, and set fire to the oil, entirely consuming the horses, barn and house, on which there was a heavy insurance. Hammond was placed under \$7,500 bonds and Mason under \$1,500 bonds. After reading such accounts as no wonder insurance companies want to take time and investigate the origin of fires where there are suspicious circumstances connected with them.

SMUGGLING PHEASANTS.—Another kind of smuggling Celestials is reported by the Ashland Tiding: Twelve pairs of Chinese pheasants arrived in Ashland the first of the week, consigned to a Pullman conductor of the S. P. R. R. and destined, it is understood, for shipment to Oakland or San Francisco. As the law of Oregon prohibits the shipments of these pheasants out of the state, dead or alive, neither the express nor railroad company will accept them for shipment, and unless they shall be smuggled across the line they will have to be shipped back to the consignor, or disposed of here. They came by express from Tangent.

A HERMIT.—Insanity causes many peculiar freaks in man's make up. Here is another, told by the Salem Democrat. Jonathan Ferrell, aged 75 years, was yesterday committed to the insane hospital from Josephine county. He is insane on religion and is vicious. For three years he has lived the life of a hermit at Grace Creek, having a rich place claim there which he had worked considerably. He denied himself nearly all the comforts of life while there were many dollars in gold dust in his cabin. Up to the time of his arrest by Constable Randle, who brought him to Salem, the old man had subsisted on cowhide diet.

The total amount of tax in Linn county, state, county, city and district will be 27 mills. That is what the DEMOCRAT man wrote it; but it was set up 28.

It has been stated that the bridge will need repainting this year. An examination of it will reveal the fact that it will not need repainting for two or three years, except perhaps in the case of a very few planks.

Republican candidates for governor are very plentiful. The latest entries in the race for the nomination are Hon. D. P. Thompson, Hon. O. N. Denny and Col. J. T. Apperson of Oregon City.

The Oregon Land Company has decided to open a branch office in Omaha. Secretary B. S. Cook, who is now in the east, will have charge of the new office until it is well established.—Salem Democrat.

E. Van Vranken, of Junction was in the city Tuesday looking for a tramp who stole a couple of rings belonging to his daughter the evening before. Not finding him here he took the local for Albany.—Harrisburg Courier. He was not here.

The Southern Pacific Company disburs over \$1,000,000 a month in gold and silver coin to employees. In its service, and the California papers say the company is again talking of paying in bank checks everywhere along the line.

DIED SUDDENLY.—News has been received of the sudden death at Deer Lodge, Mont., of Thomas Strang at the age of 64 years. Deceased lived for many years at Albany, in this state, where he was engaged in business. He was also well-known in Salem, where a son and daughter reside. Deceased was a pioneer of Oregon, having come to this state with his patents away back in the early territorial days. It is a circumstance worthy of note that both of Thomas Strang's brothers met with sudden deaths. He was a brother of Captain James Strang, of Portland, who for some years acted as a steamboat captain and pilot on the Lower Columbia. Several years ago, while acting as pilot on the steamer Topeka, Captain Strang dropped dead when that vessel was only a few miles above Astoria. About five years ago, Benjamin Strang, another brother, was engaged in working on the roof of a building in Astoria. He slipped and fell, striking in his descent a pile. He then rolled into the water, and, when taken out a few minutes later, was dead, having either been killed by the blow he received on the ground or drowned.—Portland Telegram.

DID MT. JEFFERSON SMOKE.—The Statesman said that the report that Mt. Jefferson was smoking, was all foolishness; that it was simply fog rolling up from the other side of the mountain; but the Independent of last evening says: Mt.
