The tariff talk in the house is all very eloquent, but the country is tired of eloquence. Settle the matter and let us get back to business.

The agreement of the ladies of President Cleveland's cabinet not to furnish punch-bowls at their weekly receptions will doubtless do much to relieve the uncomfortable crowding which has marked those occasions.

Settle of North Carolina contested the seat of his opponent in congress. The committee on contested elections, a majority of whom are democrats, decided in favor of Settle, who is a great republican, and the house, largely democratic, admitted him. What a contrast with the Reed congress.

President Cleveland is again in a place where he must admit that it is a condition and not a theory which confronts him. The condition in 1888 was a surplus of money in the treasury. Jerry Simpson, in a speech in congress the other day, on the tariff question, said that the people's party platform adopted at Omaha meant free trade. Ah, Jerry that will not do. The people's party in their platform dodged the whole tariff question and said nothing about it. Will the people's party in this state say any thing about the tariff question? People are watching them closely.

Many years ago, when the now venerable Captain Bassett of the senate was a youth, he was directed to place a snuff-box in each of the small recesses of the rear wall of the chamber to the right and left of the Vice President, and to keep them filled for the Clays, Websters and other senators of the old school, who were habitual snuff takers. The snuff-boxes remain as a reminder of the times and habits of senators who made history. But they are seldom filled, as Mr George of Mississippi is the only senator who uses snuff.

A fact well worthy of being carefully weighed is, that times are hard the world over. In Australia, France, Spain, Germany, Italy and Canada, people are actually suffering. Is it the menace to the tariff laws of the United States that causes times to be hard in these foreign countries? According to the theory of protectionists a reduction of the tariff is in the interests of foreigners. Then times should be good in foreign lands but they are not, and thus another protection prop is broken into smithereens.

The facts about steel rails by Congressman "Tom" Johnson in his speech on the Wilson bill are the evidence of an expert, for Mr Johnson himself is a prosperous manufacturer of steel-rails. It is refreshing to hear the voice of a manufacturer stating exact knowledge that bears witness not only to the injustices and inequalities of the McKinley law, but to the fact that the tax is not necessary, but simply goes to the swelling of abnormal profits. Mr Johnson confirms the statement made some time ago by The World, and cautiously denied by the Iron Age, that the 25 per cent tax proposed by the Wilson bill will enable the new steel-rail pool to maintain the price which it has fixed under the existing rate of 5 1/2 per cent. Speeches like Mr Johnson's let the light of truth into the dark fog of deception with which the ever-protected manufacturers have obscured the tariff question.

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AN ENEMY OF THE WILSON BILL.

Mr James H Maury has contributed to the New York World a startling array of figures to disclose the inwardness of the Sugar Trust, which dictated the McKinley sugar tariff. The trust controls refined sugar. It gets all the benefit of the McKinley duty on refined sugar and gets its material free. This trust has an actual capital of \$17,749,000 and has unloaded stock on the market to the amount of \$75,000,000. As the bonds covered more than the value of the plant the stock is all water.

The Government bounty of about \$10,000,000 a year goes chiefly to the trust. Consequently the McKinley tariff and bounty have made the individuals who dictated them and organized the trust so enormously rich that they can spend a million or two to beat the Wilson bill.

The Sugar Trust is a formidable precursor of the possibilities which may grow up under the domination of a McKinley party in this country.
