

AN ALBANY MAN REFUSES.—Judge Fullerton refused to dissolve the injunction in the case of H C Perkins et al against J E Noland, sheriff of Lane county, and the testimony will be taken. This is one of the most important cases ever tried in that county and is exciting great interest. An Albany man was honored by being appointed referee as follows: "It is hereby ordered that H C Watson, of Albany, Lane county, Oregon, be, and is, hereby appointed referee in the above entitled cause, to take and report the testimony therein, and to find the facts and the law therefrom and report the same on or before the first day of the next regular term of the court, to-wit: Monday, March 5, 1894. And it is further ordered that said referee may appoint a stenographer to take the testimony in said cause." The appointment of Mr Watson is a good one.

NOT FOR PENNOYER.—It is reported that hundreds of families are suffering for the actual necessities of life on the Santiam. It will be discovered after a time that Governor Penoyer wasn't so very far astray after all. Penoyer Independent. He is said to be some what non compos mentis. Several months ago he had trouble with his brother, resulting in his arrest.

She will probably be confined to her bed for several weeks. This was the same knee that was hurt by an accident at the coast last summer, which adds to the seriousness of the injury. A young man at Grant's Pass was fined \$50 for distributing a religious meeting at the M E church. He stood outside and swore and used obscene language. The fine, though heavy about suits the offense and should be an example generally.

The survey for the fishway over the Oregon City falls cannot be made until the water in the Willamette lowers a good deal, says the Shamokawa Eagle. Fish Commissioner McGuire says the upper Willamette will be full of salmon before January 1, 1895.

Marshal Lee has a plan for keeping the cross walks cleaned. Last evening he kept a hobo in the calaboose, and this morning gave him his breakfast for an hours work cleaning cross walks. One hobo a day would keep the cross walks in pretty good condition.

The bill authorizing proofs in timber land entries to be made before any officer authorized to take proofs in homestead cases, passed the senate on January 7th, and will become a law when signed by the president. Heretofore all proofs on land of this character have had to be made before registers of land offices.

This board yesterday bought of ex Governor Z F Moody his farm of 321 acres near this city for \$46,50. The land is to form the site of the new deaf mute school, and 200 acres are to be used for the reform school. The blind school is to be moved where the deaf mute school now is.—Salem Journal.

The Lebanon advance says. We hear of three candidates on the democratic ticket for each of the three offices of sheriff, clerk and recorder. They are: for sheriff, C C Jackson, M Scott and Jack McClure; for clerk, N P Payne, C E Standard and Riley Shelton; for recorder, E E Davis, Geo Devaney and Geo Finley.

A record has been kept from August 16, 1893, to the end of the year, of all the accidental shootings which have occurred in Oregon and Washington. The record shows that within the 19 weeks 24 accidents from guns have taken place. How many have proved fatal is not known, but 7 of the unfortunates died almost instantly after such mishaps. It is worthy of note that 15 out of the 24 so-called accidents were caused by intense excitement and great carelessness in handling guns.

THE REVIVAL

Upon invitation for questions made by Dr Driver, who is conducting the revival at the M E Church, the following two lists were presented, which the DEMOCRAT is requested to publish, and will be answered by Dr Driver at the meeting tomorrow night.

By Dr J L Hill:

1. Admitting the supreme power, the wisdom and love of God for all mankind, could he delight in human suffering?

2. If the answer is no, could he not have as easily prepared other means to save the world as the crucifixion of his son.

3. If other means could have been as effective to attain the end is there not a conflict between his love and his deed?

4. Is not God the centrifugal and centripetal forces of all power expended in molecular creation and of final salvation? And if the answer is yes, could he not have as easily saved the world without a Christ as with one?

5. Was the crucifixion of Christ intended as a miracle, to prove God's omniscience, or was it a physical necessity for the accomplishment of spiritual ends.

11. Are all that live and die in Judaism lost?

12. At this age of Christian history and knowledge are ministers of the gospel called by divine behest to preach, or is it an act of their own volition?

13. Can God make mistakes? If the answer is no, and if ministers are individually chosen and called by the Creator to do his bidding, are some persons called who fail to hear the call and hence do not respond? (a) If any who are called do not respond, are their places sometimes filled by persons not called, and not qualified, but honest in the conviction that they are doing God's bidding.

14. Is it not misleading for those not divinely called to occupy the sacred pulpit, and if misleading who, if any one, is responsible for the mistake?
