A NATIONAL PRESIDENT.—John H. Chapman, president of the National Young People's Baptist Union addressed a large audience at the Baptist church last evening. His address was quite Baptist, and brought out the progress of the church very plainly. The work of the young people was dwelt on, and the introduction of the Christian Culture Course urged as well as the support of the young peoples paper. Figures given show 37,853 churches, where there were 809 in 1793; 25,004 ministers to 1,100; 3,500,800 communicants to 65,445; \$400,000 annual contributions to \$400,000; property valued at 110,000,000 to 1,000,000, a century's progress. In educational matters there were 20 students in the 2 Baptist schools of 1793, now 28,000, and 107 colleges, with 2800 preparing for the ministry. There was 1 missionary a hundred years ago, Wm. Carey, and 665 in funds; now 7,361 missionaries, 726,833 communicants, and \$11,106,714 in contributions. Mr. Chapman is a plain appearing young man, possessing much earnestness and the zeal that counts. He left on the overland for Medford, where he will speak to-night.

ABOUT THE BRIDGE

ALBANY, Jan. 29.
Linn county as an incorporation, as I understand it, paid \$40,000 to the Albany corporation for a free wagon bridge, since the bridge lands inside the corporation of the city, Albany proposes to disregard the wishes and interests of Linn county and make it a toll bridge. Since Linn county has paid their \$40,000, Albany has put the indebtedness off on their children for the next generation, all they are doing or propose to do is to pay a small amount of interest and want to toll the bridge for that purpose. The city claims an indebtedness of \$100,000 on which they propose to pay the interest by collecting toll off Linn and Benton counties.

Linn county is unfortunate, being so closely connected with the corporation of Albany and the bridge lands inside the corporation. If Albany has law for doing as she wishes with Linn Co's share, it looks as if Linn county had better be on the look out hereafter.

If Albany wants to make it a toll bridge, the corporation of Benton county should put up toll gates at each approach in Benton county to make the citizens of Albany pay toll for using the Benton county roads. Would they not have as much right?
