

THE DISTRICT.—D D Coffey, the county assessor, is on a trip to Mill City on the north fork of the Santiam. He went there to attend to some private matters and will also enquire into the condition of the settlers in that vicinity, the report having reached Salem that the majority of them in that section are in need. Upon Mr Coffey's statement County Judge Hubbard expects to act one way or the other in regard to furnishing aid to the people on the Marion county side of the river. It is reported that the Linn county court will assist to a certain extent those in that section within its boundaries. S S Train, editor of the Albany Herald, assured Governor Penney that he would bring the matter before the court at that place. Statesman. The people up the Santiam do not consider themselves paupers, and it is proposed to help them otherwise if possible. Albany should be thoroughly canvassed tomorrow for the sale of tickets to the entertainment at the opera house for this purpose.

A P. O. ROBBERY.—Monday night the post office at Dallas was robbed of \$1600. An entrance was effected by breaking the glass of a side door. The perpetrators of the deed even stole the implements that admitted them to the contents of the safe from the Dallas foundry, being a monkey-wrench, brace and drill. Instead of blowing the safe open, they drilled a circle of holes around the combination knob, leaving it free so it could be pulled through, making a hole large enough for easy work. The face of the combination was then forced off with a pry, a hooked wire inserted and the tumbler lifted, leaving the door free to open. Eight hundred dollars in coin was taken and about \$800 in postage stamps. They even stole all the blank postal notes and money order sheets. After securing their booty they made their exit through the broken door and made their escape. Not a trace of the villains remains with the act, but the tools stolen from the foundry were left in the office lying on the floor near the broken safe.

SCHOOL MEETING.—There was a fair attendance at the school meeting last night. Hon J K Weatherford presided and stated the object of the meeting. A 2 mill tax was unanimously voted for the support of the schools and to pay the balance of \$3,000 due on the old bonds. As stated by the DEMOCRAT yesterday it was announced that a new election to vote bonds to build the third ward school house would be necessary and a petition signed by the required number was presented and another election have been called.

A SUPREME COURT CASE.—The following occurred in the supreme court at Salem yesterday: State of Oregon, respondent, vs Linn county, appellant, appeal from Linn county; argued and submitted, Geo E Chamberlain attorney for respondent and D R N Blackburn attorney for appellant. This action was instituted by the state of Oregon against Linn county, in the circuit court of Linn to recover from defendant a certain amount of taxes alleged to be due the state for the year 1891—in all \$3,733.51, and costs and disbursements.

A RUSTLER.—A San Francisco drummer in the city yesterday, told of the recent arrest at Oakland of Wm G Olenaur, formerly of this city, for embezzlement. He had been soliciting for a shirt house, and it seems was short in his accounts. He was released on bonds, and secured another position in San Francisco and a sufficient advance to settle the old matter for less than its face, about \$40, when he was discharged.
