The box sheet for Calhoun's *"Bohemian Girl"* will be opened at Hodges & McFarland's on next Saturday morning for those signing the guaranty, and on Monday for others.

THE O. P.

Hadley Wants \$10,000 on Salary.

Yesterday ex-Receiver Hadley submitted his final report as receiver of the Oregon Pacific, which we give below. Tomorrow we will publish the comment referred to on the situation, which will be in the line of the report:

"This being my final report, I beg to call your honor's attention to the fact that for my services as receiver of these properties, I have been paid only the sum of \$2000, this sum having been allowed me 'on account' by your order of July 1893. In this connection I desire to submit a few facts.

"First. That I entered upon the discharge of my duties as receiver upon the 6th day of March, 1893, and from that date until January 5th, 1894, a period of practically ten months have devoted my entire time solely and exclusively to my duties as such receiver.

"Second. That to the discharge of such duties I brought the accumulated experience of 18 years of consecutive railroad work, which experience is my capital, and which has been of the greatest benefit to the property under my charge.

"Third. I furnished in the state of Oregon, bonds to the amount of \$50,000, and having been appointed by the state court of New York, receiver of the company's property in that state, I also furnished bonds there in the sum of \$10,000.

"Fourth. That when I assumed charge of the property, I found it carrying a debt in the shape of receiver's certificates of \$80,000, in debt to its employees, for labor, to the amount of \$127,000, and owing \$25,000 for material furnished. That by reason of the confidence inspired by my appointment, I was at once able to dispose of \$40,000 of my certificates at par, the amount being paid out to the employees, upon their back pay, of which they stood greatly in need.

"Fifth. That by dispensing with various officials, reducing the salaries and force of employees, cancelling contracts, and the introduction of economical methods of operation, the properties have been operated by me at a total annual saving of about \$100,000. Twenty thousand dollars of this was saved by reduction of force and salaries in the general offices, \$4500 by reorganizing the San Francisco office, \$5000 per annum by utilizing the tug in freight and passenger service, \$10,000 by substituting wood for coal under the boilers of the steamship. An average saving also, of 20 per cent has been effected in the cost of almost every article purchased, by the close attention to the buying of supplies.

"Sixth. Prior to the appointment of a receiver the company employed the following general officers: A president, first vice president and general manager, second vice president, third vice president and treasurer, secretary and assistant treasurer, and that all of these officers were continued under the first receiver at salaries aggregating about \$30,000 annually. That I personally assumed and carried on, so far as the receivership is concerned, all the duties of the foregoing officials.

"Seventh. That I found the property entirely without insurance, and as the river and ocean boats were subject to extra hazard, and it was necessary that the property should be insured. That no funds for the payment of the premium were available, but in spite of the rules of the insurance union, forbidding the acceptance of anything but coin for premiums, and in the face of many difficulties, I finally succeeded in protecting the property by placing insurance upon it to the amount of \$224,000.

"Eighth. I have made many and important improvements to the property in the shape of repairs to track, bridges, motive power and equipment, so that the physical condition of the property is fully 20 per cent better than when I assumed charge of it.

"And lastly I beg to assure your honor that the successful operation of these properties for almost a year, burdened as they were with debts innumerable, has involved the most painstaking care, and has been accomplished only by great personal exertion. That numerous serious complications have arisen through the fact that the properties were not earning sufficient to pay their operating expenses,—employees have been several times on the verge of striking,—persons furnishing material have been on the verge of refusing further credit, and the confidence of such employees and persons in the integrity and honesty of purpose of the receiver, have such crises been averted.

"In view therefore of the above facts, I respectfully represent to your honor that I believe that I am entitled to the sum of \$10,000 as payment in full for my services, and pray that you will make an order allowing such sum and ordering it paid from the first monies that may be applicable to the purpose that may come into court or be paid into the hands of the receiver."
