TELLING TOO MUCH.

If our friends on the republican press are not watchful they will give away the governing motive of their party, which is to aggrandize the few at the expense of the many.

They call income taxes class legislation and a discrimination against the thrifty.

There is scarcely a tax, except license, in the laws of Missouri or of St. Louis which is not open to that objection. Our citizens in nearly all cases are called upon to contribute in proportion to their possessions.

It is only a tariff which forces a man to pay in proportion to his family expenditures.

Republican reasoning on the income tax implies that our states and municipalities should abandon the present system and levy taxes on consumption. Riches should be exempt and corporations should receive premiums. A man should pay for the privilege of marrying, raising children and supporting helpless relatives. That is what he does under the tariff taxation, and he pays very dearly, too.

Republicans would encourage the thrift of Russell Sage and discourage the foolishness of building a home. They would protect the wisdom of storing up dollars and rebuke the waste of buying the products of labor to make a family comfortable.

Tariffs tax necessities. An income tax would tax the surplus accumulations and not severely at that. A tariff thinks nothing of 50 per cent. An income tax is satisfied with 2 per cent.

Republicans would better guard their words.

COTTON MILLS ON THEIR FEET.

Some time ago we showed that the cotton mills of the South were prospering, and would continue to prosper without government protection. The cotton mills of the East are equally well able to stand alone.

Last year was a bad one, they say, on account of the panic and of the probability of an early reduction of the tariff, and yet the cotton factories of New England made handsome profits almost without exception. The cotton mill dividends paid in one town alone amounted to \$1,882,450.

Of the 56 mills in Fall River only seven earned less than 6 per cent net, and one of them paid a 20 per cent dividend on a capital of \$300,000. The average for the 56 mills, owned by 34 companies, was about 8 per cent. If any of them close down this year it will not be on account of the tariff.

Protection may pass for a blessing to those it protects, but to those whom it plunders it is quite another thing. Its specific object is to limit the competition for supply and thus enable the manufacturer to charge high prices to the consumer. The system regards the consumer as having no right at all except the right to be plundered—which is a blessing to the plunders, no doubt; but it is a business to which government, since government is instituted for the equal good of all, has no right to lend itself—One opinion.

Penney claims one-third of the people of Oregon are without subsistence. If it's that bad in Salem, he better move down down to Curry county. Out of a population of 2,000 there is but one person supported by the county. Times are hard here, but people find enough to eat, and money to spare for what they want to drink.—Gold Beach Gazette.

Under a McKinley tariff a man whose income is \$500 a year may pay \$100 in taxes and bounties. Under an income tax a \$5,000 income would pay \$20, or 2 per cent on all above \$4,000. There is a deficit to fill up and the \$500 incomes have about all they can stand of discrimination. Let us equalize.

Gen. Sickles did not do credit to his versatility in opposing the income tax as a "war tax." He knows and applauds the fact that the appropriations on war account have increased over \$100,000,000 in the last thirteen years. Why should not war expenses be met by war taxes?

A GREAT VICTORY.

The passage of the Wilson bill with the income tax provision attached is a great victory of the masses over the classes. The reduction of the tariff taxes, rightly interpreted means a lightening of the burdens of heavy taxation that have so long been borne by the masses of the people for the benefit of a few. It means a rehabilitation of our commerce with foreign nations, driven from the seas, when the protective policy, by our government, was inaugurated. It means that, before many years, the American flag will be floating in every harbor in the world where commerce has a footing. It means that the markets of the world will be supplied, in part at least, by the product of the American farm and workshop. The income tax means that the heavy burdens of taxation heretofore resting so heavily upon the shoulders of those least able to bear them are to be transferred, in part, to the shoulders of the wealthy classes. Now, let the senate pass the bill at once. Then let both houses pass a law for the free carriage of silver, the product of American mines, pass the appropriation bills and adjourn.

The Republican administration under Harrison was troubled about a surplus in the national treasury. The Democratic party at Washington is not troubled in that way. It is laboring with a deficit.—Salem Journal.

Too true, but where did the republicans get that surplus that troubled them so much? It was the careful savings and accumulation in the treasury of the Cleveland administration. And where did the democrats get that deficit that now troubles them? It was the result of the riotous extravagance of Harrison's administration. The less republicans say about a deficit the less they will be called upon to explain it.

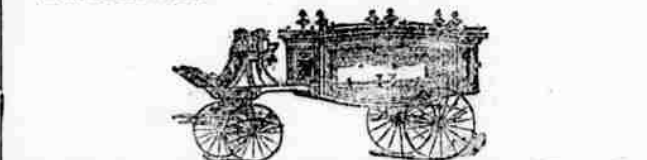
