DEATH OF ELLIS KNOX.—Dispatches received today by Mr. Geo. Knox and County Clerk Payne, announcing the death at San Jose, Calif., of Mr. Ellis Knox of this city. Mr. Knox went to that city several weeks ago hoping to be benefited by a change of climate, but gradually grew worse until his death last evening. Mr. Knox came to Oregon in 1845 from Iowa with his parents and brother, Geo. Knox and sister Mrs. Chambers, of Linn County, and a S. Knox of San Jose. He was born in Bradford county, Penn., 62 years ago, residing in Iowa at Knox Butte, where he resided continually until a few years ago, when he moved to Albany. His parents died several years ago at the advanced ages of 84 and 83 years. Also his wife, two children, Mrs. Charles Duncan and Deloss Knox, survive him. The deceased was a prosperous man, a faithful husband and father, a true citizen. A resident of Linn County nearly half a century he made many friends, and genuine regrets are heard everywhere over his death. The remains will be brought to Albany Thursday morning and buried in Knox Butte cemetery beside his parents. Funeral notice will be given hereafter.

LINN COUNTY COUNCIL

February 3, 1894.

The Linn County Business Council P. of H. met in regular session with Harmony grange.

Worthy Master H. M. Palmer in the chair.

The worthy president made a few well chosen remarks in opening the council.

The committee on investigating the county affairs, asked for further time.

The ex-agent made his annual report.

There were several resolutions introduced, one was, asking the next session of the Oregon State legislature to repeal the Board of Equalization, and another asking that the mortgage tax law be re-enacted; another, asking that the exemption laws be amended, so that all real indebtedness be taken out of assessments.

The president announced the following committees:

Legislation, M. H. Wilde, J. H. Scott, J. Clem, J. W. Swank, A. Freckson, J. H. Wigle, H. B. Springer.

Good of Order, S. A. Dawson, S. S. Train, J. Laubner, Geo. L. Reese, S. S. Myers.

Finance, J. W. Reese, Thomas Freeman, A. Blevins.

The worthy president made some lengthy remarks on the mortgage tax law.

The above resolutions were talked on by several members of the council and pretty thoroughly sifted.

The resolution in regard to the exemption law should be amended so as to read, "that reductions on indebtedness where they can show a corresponding taxable credit."

The next meeting will be held with No. 10 Grange, the first Saturday in March, 1894.

A committee on trade, was appointed, consisting of J. H. Scott, N. E. Olin and S. A. Dawson, report next meeting.

A committee to look after the millinery trade for the year 1894, consisting of sisters N. E. Olin, Palmer and Clara Swank was appointed.

On motion the secretary of the council was instructed to forward a copy of the resolutions adopted today to the secretary of the Oregon State Grange, furnish each subordinate grange in the state with a copy of the same.

The speakers who took an active part in the debate today were Messrs. A. Blevins, Laubner, Scott, Wigle, Wilde, Miller, Train, Dawson and worthy president.

THE RIGHT STARY

The old United Presbyterian church is being arranged for a kindergarten school under the auspices of the Albany Kindergarten Association, and will be occupied in a short time with Mrs. Tatham as principal, assisted by Mrs. Smick and another lady. In view of the fact the following is timely. Read it if you are a father or mother:

The paradise of childhood. What, and where is it? To answer the last question first, we would answer, "In every intelligent community where its benefits and blessings are understood."

To the second query we would reply, "That it is, as its name indicates, a place where children are always happy and therefore good," because "a good child is always a happy one." Let us pause a moment and find out right here the cause of the so-called naughtiness in children. Is it not that restless activity caused by the awakening faculties of the mind reaching out for something to lay hold of? When the "two" one is hungry, we see to it that it has its proper nourishment. What of the hungry mind and soul? This place then fills the wants of the awakening mind and soul, and hence the contentment of the children.

How stupid we are with all our boasted wisdom. We furnish the farmer with every needed implement to cultivate the soil and all manner of seeds to plant, after the ground has been thoroughly tilled. But what say you to such a man who, after having been thus provided, takes a handful of seeds and throws them over the land not having first prepared the soil? Could he expect much of a harvest? Would not the general verdict be that he lacked in common sense as well as a knowledge of his business. Perhaps someone laughs at this picture.

What better are we than this foolish husbandman, if we expect from the man grown a sound body together with a logical, well balanced mind and a grand soul, if we have not first thoroughly tilled that wonderfully fertile soil, the child's mind. What a susceptible thing it is. So plastic; taking in all sorts of impressions that afterwards harden into character. The age from three to seven is the period when the greatest care should be exercised. One has said, "Give me the child the state can have the man." This is the time to arouse the curiosity, to guide the imagination, to direct observation to things outside of itself to the great book of nature, for it is this volume the child should study before studying the abstract page; also to train the mind to be logical, to reason and think for himself, to learn to construct instead of destruct, to learn to concentrate the powers of the mind.

In short, to prepare the mind for all sorts of educational seed, to say nothing of the training of the body and the soul which must go on at the same time in order to form a well rounded character. When a little one has been thus prepared all study ever after becomes a delightful development instead of the drudgery it so often is. But I hear some practical mother or educator say: This is all good, fine theory, but where will we find such a place for our little ones, where we will not send them to get "rid" of them during the "troublesome" period before school age, but in full sympathy with this happy work will our "labors" in growing on and up in that purity and goodness which God intended for them? The kindergarten is such a place.
