

GOOD EVENING

A Hot Show.—The following characteristic letter by Judge Burnett of Corvallis in defense of Judge Fullerton against the attack of the Salem Journal, appears in the Roseburg Review. It is decidedly hot and causes the Journal to declare war on Judge Burnett also. I have no hesitation in saying to you frankly, that the article is an atrocious libel upon an upright, honorable man, and conscientious judge. It is absolutely false and without any excuse whatever, and the man who published it ought to be indicted, for he is guilty of a crime more diabolical and damnable in its conception than murder. Judge Fullerton stands high in the esteem of this community and they are indignant over this dastardly attack on his good name. The people of this district ought to rise upon mass and denounce the action of this pudding headed libeler in such terms as to make him feel the wrath of an insulted community.

AN ASSIGNMENT for the benefit of creditors was filed with the county clerk this forenoon, from L. Viereck to E. W. Laidon. Some of the property of Mr. Viereck was attached by the Linn County Bank on Saturday. In order to give his creditors an equal chance he made the assignment, reserving, as allowed by law, his barber outfit. The assets consist of 1 1/2 lots block 16 Albany, valued at \$3500; one half interest in 20 lots, Viereck's addition, valued at \$500; due from A. B. Seal, \$792.16; G. F. Russell, \$150; miscellaneous, \$148. Total \$4244. Liabilities are: First National Bank, \$1575; Pacific Building and Loan Association, \$1800; Linn County National Bank, \$530; Wm. Frum, \$300; H. Broders, \$200; J. W. Casick & Co., \$100; Peter Schlosser, \$169.65; Mrs. Saltmarsh, \$140; other bills about \$200. Total, about \$6000.
