GOOD EVENING

TOOK OFF PENNOYER.—Those eastern reporters had a big time at Ashland, as told by the Record: After partaking of a specially prepared dinner at H D Parker's Depot hotel, they came up to the hotel. Among the many things they did was an attempted parody on that famous reception of Gov. Pennoyer to President Harrison. "Where is Gov. Pennoyer? Is he here to meet me?" inquired the reporter representing President Harrison. A reporter on the platform replied: "No. His Excellency is at the state capital, tending to his own business." After this act "President Harrison" was formally introduced and spoke: "I am indeed grateful for this splendid reception. It is the proudest moment of my life. When I return to Washington I shall have the national capital moved to Ashland. We will place it in your mountains. The mountains are the place for it. The mountains produced Wm Tell," etc., etc., went the "President," each sentence being loudly applauded by the reporters with the usual bracketed remarks. Other fictitious celebrities were introduced and made speeches in a similar strain, the boys being unable to conceal the ludicrous side from which the profession view affairs that they make appear so real, earnest and solemn. Gov. Pennoyer seemed to be the only man in Oregon they knew of and expressed a desire to see the Governor.

IMMORALITY.—Mr F C Starnard writing to the Brownsville Times in a mainly letter tells of the immoral condition of society in that city. He says, among other things "We heard it said not long since by a man who had lived in sixteen different towns, that the moral standard of the young people of Brownsville was at a lower ebb than in any other town in which he had lived. But in my opinion, the young people are not to blame, for when the minds of their fathers and grandfathers—those to whom they look for example, run in channels of immorality, we can't expect anything better from the boys." The correspondent then refers to the "Oriental degree of immorality," which he joined believing it to be all right, but found though containing prominent men that there was not the least principle of virtue or morality in their ceremonies but which are mingled through with vulgar and indecent acts, and pleads for the purity of thought, word and deed. Good for Mr Starnard.

UPSET.—You might think it would be pleasant to be overturned in the mud, but if you could have seen Frank Woods, Jr., of Albany, when he arrived in this place last Saturday you would have speedily reversed your opinion. While driving along the railroad track near Brownsville, his attention was attracted from his horse and before he had time to prevent it the wheel had struck a tie and Mr Woods was sent sprawling to the ground. The horses were captured by Jeff Isom. No serious damage was done, except to the vehicle.—Brownsville Times.

A GOOD DECISION.—The Oregon supreme court made a decision recently that owners of dogs should take note of. It was the case of Cameron vs O'Brien, to recover damages from the owner of a dog which barked and frightened the plaintiff's horse. The plaintiff was thrown, and injured and brought suit for \$1500 damages. The jury gave him a verdict for that amount and the owner of the dog appealed to the supreme court. The supreme court terms the verdict and says in strong terms that the owners of barking dogs are responsible for all damages caused by such dogs and that the owners keep them at their peril.

MR HADLEY'S VERSION.

Dear Sirs: I have been confined to my house for a week past, and until some one sent me by mail, a copy of your late issue, have not seen a local paper. Your paper contains an interview with Mr C C Hogue. Now, with reference to the general matter of the interview, I have nothing to offer. On only one point do I care to be heard. My friend, Mr Hogue, is made to say in the interview referred to, that "much of the misrepresentation current, certainly emanates from Mr Hadley."

I can hardly think that he's correctly reported. The fact of the matter is that nine-tenths of the stuff that has been going the rounds of the press under the guise of "O P news" is the veriest nonsense. The writer gladly retired from all connection with the O P R R on January 6th and with the exception of filing with the clerk of court, his final report and a letter of transmittal therewith, has studiously avoided all connection with O P affairs.
